Council Fixes Dates; Close Last Sunday in September

H. C. PAGE CASE IS AGAIN PRESENTED

Exhibition Association Asks Reply—City Electrician Wants New Car

The City Council this morning decided to meet the wish of the railway authorities and make daylight saving time effective this year from first Sunday in May until the last Sunday in September. The City Council, after a long session, passed a resolution to that effect.

EXHIBITION MATTERS

H. A. Porter, for the Saint John Exhibition Association, asked what action had been taken by the city following the conference between a committee from the directors of the association and the members of the City Council. He said the committee left with the impression that the council were to have the engineers investigate the condition of the buildings and report on the amount of money necessary to spend during the next four or five years in repairs. He asked for an early reply as to what guarantee the association might expect from the city for the 1926 exhibition.

The Common Clerk said the matter had been up on January 5, last and laid on the table until such time as the financial statement of the last exhibition had been filed with the council. The communication was referred to the commissioner of safety for a report, he to notify the association of the action of the council in January.

MATTER IS SETTLED

Acting Mayor Prink said the citizens had voted for the adoption of daylight time and he thought the matter might as well be settled at once. On motion of Commissioner Sullivan it was decided to have daylight time effective, beginning at midnight on May 1 and ending at midnight on September 28.

Hon. E. M. McDonald, minister of national defence, wrote that the bill of the city solicitor, which had been sent to the city for military services during the street railway strike of 1921, was to cover the pay and allowances of local militia, called out and on duty for three days, and not to pay for the mounted police sent here. The letter was referred to the acting Mayor for a report.

LEGAL EXPENSES

A. N. Carter, for the city solicitor, wrote that the costs in the H. C. Page case, relative to an auctioneer's license, had been taxed at \$318.25, that the amount to be returned to Mr. Page was \$300 plus \$12.50 interest, making a total of \$312.50.

Commissioner Bullock suggested that the bill of the city solicitor in connection with the case be paid at the same time. The matter was referred to the acting Mayor, with power to pay the bill if correct.

TENDERS ACCEPTED

On motion of Commissioner Bullock the following tenders for materials for the harbor department were accepted: J. A. Lacey Ltd., Douglas fir, \$46.25, west side; \$47.25, east side, f.o.b. cars; George McKean and Co. Ltd., deals, \$26.40 and pine \$38; J. S. Splane and Co., 20 legs 8 and 10 inch spikes, \$7.90 and \$7.50 a keg; A. M. Rowan, 120 kegs 9 inch spikes, \$8.55 a keg; T. McAvity and Sons Ltd., 2,600 drift bolts at \$3.25 a hundred pounds. The latter was contingent on them being made in Saint John.

WANTS NEW CAR

Commissioner Harding read a report from the city electrician in which he pointed out that a new car was needed for the inspection department. The present car was six years old and would cost about \$150 to fit up. He suggested that a coupe be purchased, not to exceed \$200 and the present car. It was said that in Halifax the city electrician had two assistants and a car, also that a re-inspection of the wiring in the city was necessary in the interest of safety and the only way to cover the ground was in a car. The commissioner was authorized to purchase the car.

BOOKINGS HEAVY REST OF SEASON

More Than Thousand Due Here Sunday Evening On Montclair

Although figures have not yet been compiled officials of the Canadian Pacific Steamships, Ltd., said this morning that there was no doubt that the number of immigrants arriving at this port during the winter season would greatly exceed that of last year. So far this season figures compared favorably with last year and as the bookings for the remaining sailings of the year were very heavy they felt safe in predicting that the number of arrivals would be greatly exceeded. The import and export freights this year, it was said, were in excess of last year.

DUE SUNDAY EVENING

According to a report received at the local office of the Canadian Pacific Steamships, Ltd., today the S. S. Montclair is due to arrive in port tomorrow evening from Liverpool, Greenock and Belfast, with 181 cabin and 875 third-class passengers. In event of her not arriving until that time the passengers will remain on board and will be rushed forward to their destinations in special trains on Monday morning.

Yesterday two Canadian Pacific steamships left Saint John. The Montclair sailed for Liverpool with 77 cabin and 181 third class passengers, in addition to a large general cargo. The Marlow sailed for Cherbourg, Southampton and Antwerp with 65 third class passengers and a large general cargo.
