## \$7,000 LOSS IN ARROSTOCK JCT. FIRE LAST NIGHT

Whole Town Was Threatened For Time—Some Talk of Investigation

Word was received here this morning of a \$7,000 fire in Arrostock Junction, Victoria county, shortly before midnight, which threatened the destruction of the village. The store of Mrs. Hatfield Burt, and a double tenement house, owned by G. E. Stealey, of Hartland, were destroyed. Part of the furniture in the tenement house, which was occupied by G. Thibodeau and Gordon MacNally, was saved in a damaged condition, but the stock in the store was destroyed.

Sparks from the burning buildings were carried by the wind for a distance of 500 yards and dropping on several house tops, started fires, which were extinguished by villagers, who with buckets, hose from water taps and wet blankets, saved many buildings from destruction.

### INQUIRY TALKED OF

The cause of the fire is not known, so far as can be learned, and it is understood that an investigation will be made probably by the provincial fire marshal.

The store had been opened recently. On April 10 last, Jarvis & Son, Ltd., of this city, placed \$1,400 on the grocery stock and \$200 on the fittings and fixtures. The value of the stock was given as \$2,100. There was some insurance on the building, but the amount is not known here.

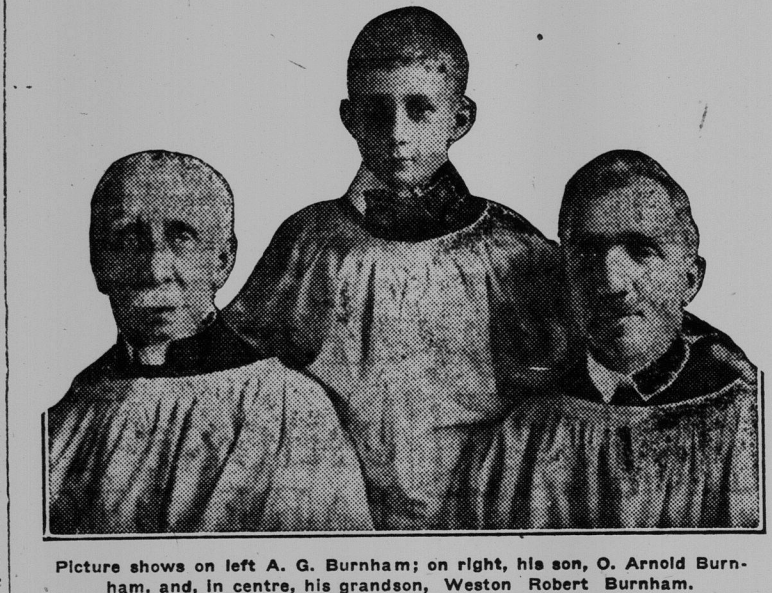

## THREE GENERATIONS OF ONE FAMILY ARE IN STONE CHURCH CHOIR

IT DEVELOPS that Trinity Anglican Church, of Streetville, Ont., does not hold the Canadian record for having three generations of a family represented in the choir, as a Toronto newspaper claimed recently, for in the choir of St. John's (Stone) Church in this city are singers who are grandfather, son and grandson. They are A. G. Burnham, his son, O. Arnold Burnham, and the latter's son, Master Robert, all of 316 Princess street.

A. G. Burnham was born in the town of Digby, N. S., in 1851, the son of Daniel L. Burnham. The family came to Saint John in 1860. A. G. Burnham joined the choir of Stone Church in 1870, or 56 years ago, when the late Rev. George M. Armstrong, uncle of Rev. H. B. Armstrong, was rector. Since then Mr. Burnham has been a member of the choir of Stone Church, although he has been absent from the city for brief periods. He sings bass. Mr. Burnham was for many years with Manchester Robertson Allison, Ltd., retiring only last January.

His son, Arnold, joined the choir about 20 years ago, and has been a member ever since. He also sings bass.

Master Robert, who is 13 years of age, became a Stone Church chorister when the late Rev. Gustav A. Kuhring was rector. He and several other lads formed the first boys' choir of Stone Church.

### Births In City 26 And Deaths Are 15

Six marriages, 26 births, 12 boys and 14 girls, and 18 deaths were reported to the sub-district Board of Health during the week ending today. The deaths were from the following causes: Pneumonia, three; senility, two; myocarditis, two; and colitis, pyelitis, peritonitis, meningococci, oedema of lungs, osteoarthritis of lungs, cerebral haemorrhage and carcinoma of stomach, each one.

### COUNTY MARKET

More Like Spring In The Offerings At The Stalls Today

A small quantity of spring lamb offered in the city market today brought \$3 for fore and \$5 for hind quarters. Some nice fowl sold at from 45 to 50 cents a pound. There was not much change in meats, prices being as follows: Beef, 14 to 15 cents; veal, 14 to 15 cents; pork, 28 to 32 cents.

Fresh extras in eggs were selling at 28 cents a dozen and 35 cents for the first. Dairy butter was 35 to 40 cents and creamery 45 cents. Maple sugar was selling at 45 cents a pound with a small supply, and the syrup was bringing 35 and 40 cents a bottle.

A small quantity of native rhubarb was selling at 15 cents a pound, a shade off from last week. Strawberries were nice and were selling at 30 cents a pint box. Large heads of California celery were bringing 40 to 50 cents each; new imported potatoes, 10 cents a pound; and new onions the same.

Carrots, 15 to 20 cents a bunch; southern tomatoes, 35 cents a pound; radishes, 10 cents a bunch or three for 25 cents; iceberg lettuce, 25 to 35 cents a head; and the native, 10 cents. String beans were selling at 40 cents a quart, and green peas at 30 cents.

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## WILL EXTEND HYDRO TO EAST SAINT JOHN

Main Purpose is to Supply The County Institutions With Current

The Civic Power Commission at its meeting yesterday afternoon authorized the extension of a line to serve the public institutions in the Parish of Simonds and a contract with the Canadian Westinghouse Company for the supply of transformers for the coming year.

A request from the Workmen's Compensation Board that the Commission pay an amount due by the Stephen Construction Co. on the payroll under the contract this company had with the city for the hydro distribution system was left with the accountant secretary to deal with.

The chairman, F. S. X. McMullin, was in the chair and Commissioner Harding and Messrs. M. Rowan, J. N. Flood, Councillor G. H. Simpson and James Lewis, M. L. A., were present with the accountant secretary and engineer.

The engineer, Barry Wilson, presented a report on the cost of extending the line to serve the public institutions in Simonds. The total cost was \$8,500, the yearly cost of operation was estimated at \$1,464.70 and the revenue at \$1,710, leaving a surplus of \$245.30.

He also reported that the Commission was not liable for this bill and the matter was left in his hands to deal with.

### LOWEST TENDER

The engineer reported that the contract for transformers had expired and he had asked prices from the Packard Electric Co., the Canadian General Electric Co. and the Canadian Westinghouse Co. Of these the Canadian Westinghouse was the lowest and it was decided to make a contract with them for the supply of transformers for the coming year.

The Workmen's Compensation Board wrote asking the Commission to pay an amount due from the Stephen Construction Co. on the payroll of the company during the time it was building the distribution system for the city. The accountant secretary reported that he had been advised that the Commission was not liable for this bill and the matter was left in his hands to deal with.

## REPLACEMENT WORK FINISHED BY JUNE 5

Superintendent J. M. Woodman Speaks of C. P. R. Operations on Line

The replacements in this division would be completed by June 5, it was said this morning by J. M. Woodman, superintendent of the N. B. division of the C. P. R., who returned last evening after a tour of inspection. He was at Woodstock, Presque Isle and St. Andrews and said that replacement work was going along very well. If the work was finished by June 5 it would be a very good record, as the work was about three weeks late starting, owing to the lateness of the spring.

There was quite a little snow in the woods yet, but there was no fear now of any water trouble, the superintendent said. The Saint John River also was falling a little up north. Conditions were normal now on the Arrostock branch, where trouble had been experienced this spring, the ice all having left the river, with the exception of a little grounded on the banks.

### SELLING RAW MILK

Some County Dealers and Authorities said to Be at Odds

Pending final arrangements as made by the special committee of Board of Health officials, government representatives and private citizens in arriving at a solution of the pasteurized milk proposals, it is said there has been some raw milk selling. The report is that some milkmen in the country, encouraged by recent political changes, have been evading the pasteurization regulation amongst those who demand raw milk. This demand, health officials say, is not great and the bulk of milk is still passing through the pasteurization plants. Those accused of evading the regulation have been threatened with a cancellation of license and report further states that this matter of license is also being ignored by those handling the raw product.

### Examinations To Be Held On May 21

It has been decided that the examinations for the Canadian Life Underwriters degree will be held in this city on May 21. The presiding examiner will be F. O. Conlon. This subject was discussed at the monthly luncheon of the Life Underwriters' Association of New Brunswick today in the Admiral Beatty Hotel with Hugh Campbell, president, in the chair. The luncheon was followed by a business session during which the recently imposed provincial tax on insurance companies also came up for discussion. It was decided to discontinue for the summer months the holding of meetings, except on call of the chair. The delegation that went to Fredericton to oppose the enactment of the insurance tax was thanked. The examinations for the C. L. U. degree were explained by F. O. Conlon, who urged the necessity of taking these examinations.
