Word was received here this morn-ing of a \$7,000 fire in Aroostook Junetion, Victoria county, shortly before midnight, which threatened the de-struction of the village. The store of Mrs. Hatfield Burtt, and a double tenement house, owned by G. F. Steeley, of Hartland, were destroyed. Part of the furniture in the tenement house, which was occupied by G. Thibodeau and Gordon MacNally, was saved in a damaged condition, but the stock in

the store was destroyed. Sparks from the burning buildings were carried by the wind for a distance of 500 yards and dropping on several house tops, started fires, which were extinguished by villagers, who with buckets, hose from water taps and wet blankets, saved many building from
