From the start to finish it was a "neck and neck" race between the champion and the United States runner. When the pistol cracked, Hennigar leaped into the lead with Miles a few yards behind and McLellan and Rae Hamilton, local runner, in third place.

Miles kept just behind Hennigan until they were in the tenth mile, when he spurted ahead and remained so until he broke the tape. The Dorchester athlete made a "last minute" effort to regain his lead and nearly got abreast of Miles while about a quarter of a mile from the finish, but with another spurt, the champion again forged ahead.


