

MILES DEFEATS UNITED STATES CHAMPION IN HALIFAX RACE

Mike McTigue Surprises Fans By Decisively Outpointing Johnny Risko

INTERNATIONAL EVENT WON BY SYDNEY RUNNER

Crowd of 8,000 Watch Henning Go Down to Defeat

Canadian Press Despatch. HALIFAX, July 1—John C. Miles, of Sydney Mines, Boston Marathon champion, this afternoon won the international 10-mile race here, defeating Jim Henning, United States 10-mile champion, by about 100 yards. Miles, 21 years of age, won the race in 50 minutes 44 1/2 seconds.

From the start to finish it was a "neck and neck" race between the champion and the United States runner. When the pistol cracked, Henning leaped into the lead with Miles a few yards behind and McLellan and Rae Hamilton, local runners, in third place. Miles kept just behind Henning until they were in the tenth mile, when he started ahead and remained so until he broke the tape. The Dorchester athlete made a "fast minute" effort to regain his lead and nearly got abreast of Miles while about a quarter of a mile from the finish, but with another spurt, the champion again forged ahead.

8,000 PRESENT A crowd of 8,000 spectators, the largest number that ever attended sporting meet here, witnessed the race. Prior to the ten-mile event, Miles was presented with a gold watch by Hon. J. C. Douglas, Attorney General of Nova Scotia, and a club bag by Deputy Mayor Louis Gaston, on behalf of the city of Halifax. The Crescents Amateur Athletic Association, under whose auspices the event was staged, presented him with a silver loving cup.

SETS TRACK RECORD. HALIFAX, July 1—Vera Grattan, 2:09 1/4, imported by Frank Adams, local turf man, from Quebec, racing to beat 2:18 for the mile here this afternoon, made a new track record of 2:11 at the exhibition track. This was the fastest mile ever run in Halifax. The old record was 2:11 1/4.

IRISHMAN TOO FAST AND WISE FOR OPPONENT

Despite 15-Pound Handicap Former Champ Outights Cleveland Baker

NEW YORK, July 2—Mike McTigue, former light heavyweight champion of the world, decisively outpointed Johnny Risko, of Cleveland, in a ten round bout at the Garden last night. McTigue's victory came as a surprise to his followers following Risko's large margin over the present champion, Pat Berinbach, in the same ring several weeks ago. McTigue led the crowd to Berinbach last summer.

The former 175 pound holder made a brilliant showing against his heavyweight opponent Berinbach, but McTigue, one of the ten rounds. Two went to Risko and the others were even, according to critics. McTigue employed a flashing right cross to the jaw, and a right uppercut to batter down his opponent. In a furious tenth round rally, the former champion staggered the Clevelander twice. Risko was aggressive throughout, but helpless before McTigue's reach and boxing skill.


