REGINA FIRE LOSS. REGINA, SASK., July 24.—Total loss sustained by the Canadian Oil Company by the fire at the Regina plant, as the result of a fire yesterday, is now placed at \$250,000; \$175,000 to stock, and equipment, and \$75,000 to the building.

FIRE LOSS PLACED AT OVER \$35,000

Dock Street Blaze Last Evening Did Damage to Building and Stock

The loss in the fire which damaged the building in Dock street last night, occupied by Tuckett, Ltd. and Frank Fales & Sons, Ltd., will exceed \$35,000, it was estimated this morning, but the definite figure cannot be arrived at until the adjusters have completed their work.

B. Nichols, local manager for Tuckett's said he estimated the loss at \$30,000, but could not say how much insurance was carried as the policies were handled at the head office of the company. The damage of F. Fales & Sons was placed at more than \$2,000, covered by insurance.

Frank T. Lewis, owner of the building, said that he had not been able to estimate the damage, but added that it was entirely covered by insurance. S. A. Jones of Jones & Schofield, said that the firm had about 100 casks of molasses stored in the cellar of the building, but so far as they could ascertain this morning these had suffered very little damage.

The Tuckett Tobacco Co., Ltd., occupies the ground floor of the building, while the second and third floors are occupied by Frank Fales & Sons, Ltd., custom brokers and handlers of fishing supplies.
