Great possibilities in both the local fishing and mineral industries were told of at a meeting of the Industrial Committee of the Saint John Board of Trade this morning. W. W. Leonerd, of Leonard Fisheries, said that there was a wonderful field for the development of the fishing industry in and about Saint John, particularly the export trade. This development, he pointed out, would mean more employment.

IN MINERALS.

Dr. Wm. McIntosh, curator of the Natural History Society, submitted an exhaustive report of the mineral potentialities of the province, showing that development in this regard had been so far only on the top. He said wonderful opportunities in the development of mineral products existed in New Brunswick.

SUGAR BIG HELP IN BOOST OF IMPORTS

Chief Cause of Large Increase in Customs Receipts Over Year Ago.

The great increase in the customs J. Bay has been completed and the vessel


