

CLOSE CALL FOR THE DRY LAW

Only Four Majority Against Repeal in Alberta

Municipal Districts Association Vote—Details of the Moderation League Proposals for Government Control in Manitoba.

Calgary, Nov. 2.—Only by the narrow majority of four votes was a resolution defeated yesterday at the opening session of the fourteenth annual convention of the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts, asking the Alberta government to repeal the present liquor act and to establish a system of government control on the lines adopted by British Columbia.

Winnipeg, Nov. 2.—Details of the proposed government liquor control bill which the Moderation League will present to the Manitoba legislature backed up by petitions and on which it is expected that a referendum will be taken early next summer, are announced.

It is proposed that a committee of three members should administer the act and that adults living in the province and tourists should be entitled to purchase liquor on production of a permit which would cost one dollar and in such quantities as the commission should determine. Local option areas, in which there should be no government stores would be made possible.

There would be no drinking legally in public places, and no provision would be made for sale in taverns or restaurants as in Quebec province. It would be provided that beer might be purchased direct from the breweries on production of a purchaser's permit.

One half the profits earned under the proposed act would go to the province and the balance to the municipalities "in accordance with their assessment."

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 2.—The British Columbia government is continuing its fight to get absolute control of all liquor importation into this province. Attorney-General Manning yesterday gave notice of a resolution, similar to that of last year, asking the federal parliament at its next session to prohibit the exportation of intoxicating liquors into British Columbia for use here, except by the provincial government.

FIRST CLINIC AT HEALTH CENTRE

The first clinic was held yesterday in the new health centre in Sydney street. The St. John Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis moved on Tuesday from its former headquarters in Prince William street and held a clinic yesterday. Dr. H. A. Parris was in charge and was assisted by Miss Brophy, nurse.

The time table for the tuberculosis clinics will be the same in the new quarters as it was in the free dispensary. The Monday and Wednesday clinics will open at 2.30 p. m. and the Thursday evening clinic at 7.30 o'clock. The children's clinic will be held on Friday afternoon at 2.30. The examining doctors also will be the same, Dr. Parris and Dr. A. E. Logie, for the adult clinics, and Dr. Davis Murray for the children's clinic.

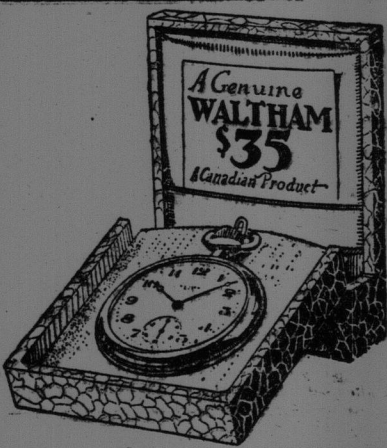

Seek to Break Will of Charles F. Kohl

Widow of New York, Accepted Settlement of \$250,000 as Her Share.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 2.—A petition to set aside the will of Charles F. Kohl of San Francisco, capitalist, who killed himself at his Delmonico home last year, has been placed on record. Harry S. Hunter and Leon S. Dexter, relatives, who had been left \$300,000 each in a previous will, filed the petition in the San Mateo Superior Court charging that Kohl made his last will when under the influence of Mrs. Marion Lunderbeck Lord, now touring Europe, who was left nearly \$1,200,000.

Mrs. Kohl of New York, the widow, accepted a \$250,000 cash settlement as her share of the estate. It was said Kohl was engaged to wed Mrs. Lord.

POLICE COURT.

Mrs. Margaret Lynch was charged with having liquor in her shop in Prince Edward street and was fined \$50. The evidence of Inspectors Killen and Carson was taken to the effect that six bottles of beer were found in a trunk in a back room. W. M. Ryan appeared for the prosecution, and E. S. Ritchie for the defence.

William C. Parker, charged with selling bread under weight, came before the magistrate yesterday afternoon for judgment. The detective declared that there had not been any further complaints since the offense occurred more than a week ago. The accused was then fined \$25, but the fine was allowed to stand.

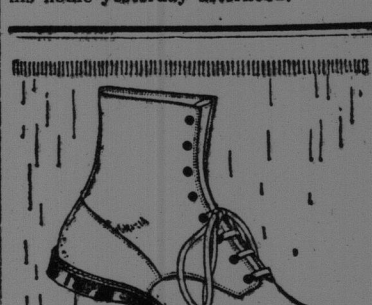
WOMEN'S NIGHT CLASSES.
