Toronto, Feb. 3.—A committee of the legislature appointed to inquire into the operation of the Ontario Temperance Act, held its concluding sitting yesterday when the report of a sub-committee, appointed at the last meeting, was under consideration. The chief matters were the right of appeal and the joint enforcement of general laws by the provincial police and license inspectors. There will probably be a minority report tabled.

As regards the question of appeal, it was recommended that this should be on the record of evidence taken before the convicting magistrate, such appeal to be to a judge in chambers of the supreme court of Ontario. Against this there was an amendment favoring an appeal to a county judge with a case, but this was defeated by ten votes to seven.
