UNION WORKERS MANUFACTURERS

Ladies' Clothing to Be Made by Employes in Their Own Factories.

New York, July 21.—Profiteering in the women's garment industry will be fought with union owned shops, factories and stores by the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union. This became known here when officials of the union announced that it has a committee at work laying the foundation for the first group of union owned factories, which are expected to be in operation by next Spring.

These factories are to be established, according to Benjamin Schlesinger, international president, to demonstrate that the workers can be paid first class wages, work fewer hours and enjoy better working conditions than they are now getting and reap a "reasonable profit" from their product and still sell it considerably under the regular market price. The union proposes to sell its output to consumers through their own stores. Officials said that the first group of six factories will be established in New York, together with several union stores, others will be located in Chicago and Philadelphia. Ample funds for the factories have been provided by the international union, Mr. Schlesinger said, and later as more money is needed "union shop and factory assessments" will be levied to finance the project until it is put on a paying basis.

We expect to be turning out medium and high price garments for the Spring trade," A. Baroff, secretary of the union said. "The first factories will probably employ about 1,000 workers to be selected by the union." They will pay higher wages than are paid by the garment industry in general, he said, and a seven-hour work day will be in effect. The workers now work an eight hour day with a half holiday on Saturday.

The local unions of the Ladies' Garment workers, according to Mr. Baroff, are also taking steps on their own initiative to defeat the high cost of living by establishing co-operative restaurants and stores. Some stores have been started in New York and, he said, a restaurant is being operated by unions in Philadelphia.

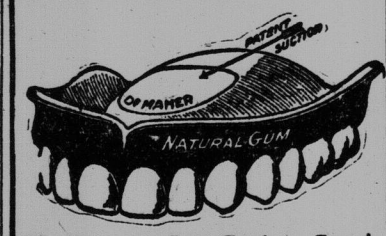

THIEVES WERE NOISY

Hammered So Hard Were Mistaken for Workmen.

New York, July 21.—Thieves who robbed two safes in the offices of Fred Van Ness and G. W. Bernheimer & Co., at 240 West 27th street, a week ago, made so much noise that people in an adjoining tenement thought emergency repairs were being made. One woman said hammering continued so long that she was tempted to telephone the police to order the "workmen" to stop until daylight. Details in the robbery, withheld by the police, became known in the arraignment of a suspect before Magistrate Marsh in the Jefferson Market Court. The man was discharged for lack of evidence.

The Bernheimer Company, engaged in a similar business, reported the theft of \$2,000 in Liberty bonds. LEASED TO STEFANSSON

Half of Baffin's Land for Reindeer Ranch.

Ottawa, July 21.—That portion of the southern half of Baffin's Land, south of parallel 68 degrees north latitude, including a strip ten miles wide along the north boundary of Lake Metelling, is to be leased to Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Canadian Arctic explorer, for the purpose of grazing herds of reindeer and muskoxen for the period of thirty years, with a period of renewal not to exceed twenty years to be provided for. This is authorized in an order-in-council gazetted this week.

Mr. Stefansson is to be given free grazing privileges for fifteen years, after which he is to pay an annual rental of \$12,000. Mr. Stefansson has represented to the government that he has interested sufficient capital to assure the enterprise being successfully carried out.

BEAR MAKES FIERCE ATTACK ON BROWNVILLE FARMER

Clayton Arbo has Terrifying Struggle Lasting Over an Hour—Quick Wit and Strategy Saved Life

Brownville, July 21.—Clayton Arbo, a farmer of this town, and hunter and guide of experience, fought for over an hour early this week with a big hungry black bear which had attacked him in the woods not a mile from his house, and only escaped by dealing the animal a staggering blow on the side of the head with a club he had managed to pick up.

The bear halted the beast for a moment and as Mr. Arbo had been able to reach an open field he outfooted the bear and made his escape.

Mr. Arbo's story of his terrifying battle is sensational enough for a newspaper, but it is fully authenticated—not only by the man's appearance when he had reached his house, but by neighbors who heard his cries in the woods and by one man who saw the two when they came into the open.

Mr. Arbo is a powerful man about forty-five years of age. He had gone into the woods to hunt for a cow which had gone astray when he came suddenly upon the bear. The bear closed in on him before he could get away. Terrified he gave a scream at the top of his voice. The bear was growling fiercely, but the man made so much louder noise

Frank Flynn started after the record with \$264 for the first two weeks in the month, but when it was announced that Witkowski's earnings had been \$329.04, he was an easy leader.

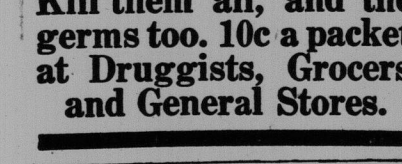
REFUSE TO STATE AGE TO GET ON VOTING LIST

Mrs. McCarter declares she will contest the ruling which was based on a decision of the attorney-general that a woman can not register unless she give her age more definitely than "over twenty-one."

FLY TO BUSINESS

About One Hundred Americans Go by Air Route Daily.

New York, July 21.—About 100 business men scattered throughout the United States more or less regularly fly in airplanes between their homes in the country, at the mountains or the shore, to their city offices, according to an estimate of the Manufacturers' Aircraft Association. The number of itinerant aerial "taxi-drivers" who carry passengers on short but remunerative flights is placed at some 300.

There is a steadily increasing demand for aircraft of the "commercial type," says a report made to the association, "but, contrary to some published reports, the demand does not equal the supply. Factories now in operation in the United States can construct ten times the number of aircraft which optimists estimate would be required this year."

A trip throughout the country taken by representatives of the association revealed some interesting facts to which the tourist season, the investigators reported "a passenger airplane makes daily runs over and around Mount Rainier, flying at 30,000 feet, some 5,000 feet above the mountain.

"At the Santa Barbara seaside resort a flying boat is in daily operation over the channel, two of its most interesting passengers during the early part of this year having been the King and Queen of Belgium. Regular flights are being conducted over Southern California with a baby blimp.

"There is considerable agitation for an extension of the aerial forest patrol of California, which has been instrumental in protecting life and property from fire loss. The California Rice Growers' Association, which last year established a service patterned after the forest patrol over 16,000 acres of rice lands, has enlarged this service to guard double that acreage.

EVIDENCE OF PREHISTORIC PEOPLE FOUND IN TEXAS

Austin, Texas, July 21.—Evidence that Texas was inhabited by a prehistoric people different from the Indian who roamed the plains when the first men came has been unearthed by James E. Pearce, professor of anthropology of the University of Texas. The early inhabitants, he said, lived a nomadic-like existence, roaming for more part of the day from place to place, and killing with rude stone weapons, animals and even humans for food.

In co-operation with the Smithsonian Institute Bureau of Ethnology, Professor Pearce has been investigating the mounds for more than a year, he reported.

"The life history of these people has been read from the records they left in their burned-rock mounds or kitchen middens," the professor said. "These mounds are piles of broken and charred bits of limestone three or four feet high and sometimes as long as 100 feet. They

Australian Coal to Sweden

It was reported this week that Australia had just recently completed a sale of some 240,000 tons of coal to Sweden. It is thought that this is the largest sale of Australian coal to Sweden that ever has been made. In the past Sweden has obtained the bulk of her coal from England, and lately has been dependent upon the United States. It is interesting to note that the price of this coal delivered in Sweden is reported to be nearly one-half less than that at which British coal would have to be sold. Norwegian buyers also are reported to be looking into Australian coal and it would not be surprising to the trade here if some substantial transactions in that direction were announced in the early future. British and American coal export embargoes are held to be contributing factors to the loss of this business to these two countries.
