NATIVE STOCK. Native vegetables are now offering in the country market, a fairly abundant stock being on hand this morning. Meats were in good supply, but the prices still remain quite high. Butter was lower today, bringing from twenty-five to twenty-eight cents, while eggs were plentiful at from twenty-three to twenty-five cents a dozen. The prices of native vegetables were as follows: Carrots, ten cents a bunch; spinach, twelve cents; celery, fifteen cents; radish, five cents; asparagus, thirty-five cents, and lettuce six cents.
