## HAVE HARBOR TRIP TODAY IN RAIN STORM

British Capitalists are the Welcome Guests of St. John

THOSE IN THE PARTY

Visitors Much Impressed By Canada and Maritime Provinces are Likely to Benefit in a Business Way

The visiting party of sixty-five British business men who are touring Canada arrived in St. John by special train at 9:40 this morning and today are the guests of the city and the board of trade. A trip around the harbor was taken this morning in spite of the rain and for this afternoon an automobile trip around the city and a visit to the golf club for tea are planned. The visitors will remain in St. John over night and will leave tomorrow morning for Fredericton by river steamer as the guests of the provincial government.

While touring Nova Scotia the party split into two sections. They reunited last night at Truro and came through to St. John together on their special train.

On arriving in the city they were met at the station and escorted to the Royal Hotel where they will make their headquarters while here. They were met by Mayor Fook and the city commissioners, President H. C. Schofield of the board of trade and other members of the board. Lieutenant Governor Wood and other prominent citizens. A brief reception was held in one of the Royal parlors and a speech of welcome was delivered by Mayor Frink.

Mr. Palmer, replying for the visitors, expressed appreciation of the hearty welcome and joyfully remarked that the St. John people had even shown the foresight to make them feel at home by providing typical British weather.

The party then left for Reed's Point where they embarked on the ferry steamer Harbor and Courtenay Bay. Lunch, for which the catering was done by George Wanamaker, was served on board and the party returned to the city about two o'clock.

The party, which includes representatives of the largest British industrial concerns and business houses in the Maritime Provinces of London, and is under the direction of W. Leonard Palmer, John Boyd of Montreal, the Canadian representative of the Financial News, accompanied the party. During their tour of the Maritime Provinces they will be accompanied by the I. C. R., also accompanied them and has made all possible arrangements for their comfort and convenience.

The visitors all expressed themselves as being delighted with their trip so far, having been impressed with the commercial, agricultural and industrial developments of the country and gratified by the warmth of their reception.

Discussion among the members of the party reveals prospects of substantial developments as a result of their visit. There is more than a possibility that the growth of the maritime provinces will be stimulated by the investment of British capital as a consequence to the tour of these wide-awake and far-sighted business men.
