COUNTERFEIT SILVER COINS CIRCULATED

Half Dollars and Quarters Should Be Inspected as Imitations Are Excellent

A flood of counterfeit fifty and twenty-five cent pieces is reported in the city. They are exceptionally good imitations of the genuine, and there is enough silver in them to make them ring when tossed on the counter. The design is copied almost accurately and the only differences are in the milling, which is not quite so clear cut as on the genuine coin, and in the color, the counterfeit being of slightly less lustrous appearance as compared with the white of the silver. It can be understood that they might be readily accepted if presented with other coins, and, as a matter of fact, only close inspection will show that they are bad, and for this reason it is most urgent that a careful watch be kept.

EASTER TRADE IN ST. JOHN WAS NEVER BETTER

Saturday Saw Crush of Buyers and Merchants Report it a Fine Season

Easter business in St. John this year was exceptionally good, so the merchants report. The fine warm weather of Saturday brought the people from their homes, and from early morning until late at night, the principal stores in the city were crowded. The millinery, dry goods, furnishings and boot and shoe traders, with the florists, did a great business, but from the smallest dealer to the largest, business was as brisk as it has been for some years. In the millinery departments, the latest creations found ready sale, and in the ladies' dress departments, many hobbles skirts found purchasers, but no sales of any 'harem' were reported.

The footwear dealers did very large business. At one time Saturday, the store of Waterbury & Bishop had to close for a moment in order to allow those inside to be waited on, and to straighten out for the rush. R. J. Walsh, said that in thirty-three years of the firm's business, he never saw such a crush at Easter. In Manchester, Robertson, Allison, Lidd, Macaulay Bros. Co., and F. W. Daniel & Co.'s large staffs of clerks were kept busy all day administering to the wants of the buyers. In these stores the sales consisted chiefly of millinery, gowns, ribbons, gloves, ties, etc., and all reports have done a very large business.

In T. McAvity & Sons and W. H. Thorne Co. Ltd., business was about the same. In the latter store, hats and caps of all descriptions were great demand, and D. Magee & Sons, J. L. Thorne & Co., J. B. Bardsley, P. S. Thomas, C. & E. Everett, and the other city hat makers, a large business.

Gilmour, Horace Brown and most of the other city tailors were kept busy turning out Easter suits, and they also report a busier Easter than heretofore.

In fact, it can be said that Easter of 1911 will go down as a record breaker in store annals.
