Regina, September 15, 1943.

Dear Sir:

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I suppose you have seen by the newspapers that Edward Stonechild, one of our Indians from the Muscowpetung Reserve in the Qu'Appelle Agency, was in a drunken brawl in a shack on Albert Street North which resulted in the death of a young Indian girl from Kamsack by the name of Evelyn Severight. This happened over a month ago and Stonechild has since been convicted.

Upon his arrest Stonechild was found to have in his possession a Saskatchewan Liquor Permit, Serial Number 95424, issued from the liquor store on Scarth Street here in Regina. This whole matter was investigated by the R.C.M. Police and I understand you have a Police Report on it. What I wish to point out is that there are times when Indians obtain liquor permits by claiming to be half-breeds and in many cases it would be difficult for the issuer to determine whether the applicant was really a half-breed or an Indian, but in this case there was absolutely no excuse for the man in the liquor store to issue a permit to Edward Stonechild. This Indian has a very dark complexion with jet black hair and nobody could ever take him for a half-breed.

When the Treaties were made with the Indians the Canadian Government promised them that liquor would be kept away from them and I believe our Branch are doing their best to carry this out. However, knowing that you would not tolerate matters of this kind I appeal to you to take steps to see that the men who sell the liquor permits are instructed not to sell permits to Indians even if they are in uniform.
