

No person shall ride or drive any by cicle or trycicle upon or along any of the public streets or highways in the City of Freder alarm or sound, while the machine so ridden attached thereto if driven after sunset, a lantern in addition to the alarm bell, such lantern to be so arranged as to throw a cle light for a distance of at least twenty feet che ahead of the machine, while in motion. Any pot rson riding or driving any such bycicle or

on shall be liable to a penolty not exceeding Ten dollars for each offence.
