Child Colonies in Canada Would Be Salvation of England's Poor Children

The great and generous British nation grudges no expenditure upon its state children, provided that good results from such expenditure can be shown. Unfortunately, this is far from being the case, as some 50,000 are being brought up in such a manner as to make them exceedingly unfit to get on in the world.

Now, if we wanted our own children to become userul, nandy, independent people, should we bring them up at the Hotel Cecil-year in, year out, mind you-until sixteen years old? No, we should do no such thing. Yet the rate payers are only just awakening to the fact, which I first brought to their notice three years ago, that they are pay-ing enormous sums to provide Hotels Cecil for their pauper children-that is, huge institutions, or else groups of elaborate and costly "village homes," from which they emerge totally and necessarily ignorant of how to meet the difficulties of life.


