CROMWELL DENIES PANAMA GRAFT

SAYS CHARGES IN WORLD ARE UTTERLY FALSE

President Roosevelt Is Ashamed of a Certain Set of

Americans.

New York, Dec. 11.-Wm. Nelson Cromwell yesterday authorized the following statement:

"My attention has been called to a statement issued by the editor of the Indianapolis News, in which he attempts to reply to the charges by "I Shot Them and That is All President Roosevelt that certain statements in the Indianapolis News and relating to the purchase of the Panama canal by the United States were false and untrue. The editor of the News in his reply stated that 'the other men, such as Cromwell and Morgan, who were believed to have full knowledge in regard to the business, said nothing,' and he attempts to justify the publication of the statements appearing in his paper by saying that they were based largely on statements of the New York World, criticisms of which were made over and over again during the campaign and were utterly ignored until to-day.
