The London "Times" Contempt for Canada.

(From "The Times," July 24.)
"We print this morning the address to the Queen concerning the affairs of Ireland recently adopted by the Senate and Commons of Canada, together with the reply addressed to the Marquis of Lorne by Lord Kimberley. The fact that such an address had been voted was mentioned in English newspapers at the time; but the announcement scarcely produced the sensation which was generally expected. The public vote on the valuable institution of Parliamentary papers the reason of which is really interesting and even amusing in a very high degree. It opens, in accordance with the best precedents, with an earnest desire on the part of the Canadian Parliament to renew the expression of their unwavering loyalty and devotion to Her Majesty's person and Government. That is an entirely innocent and even praiseworthy a desire that every well-wisher to Canada will profoundly regret the extremely unfortunate manner in which her representatives have attempted to satisfy it. Had their aim been to resemble their love we hardly know how they could more effectively have compassed it than by sending such an address at this time. Just when Her Majesty's Government is engaged in a severe struggle with anarchism and sedition in Ireland, Canadian loyalty and devotion assume the form of a public and formal recommendation of the rebellion and treason should be legitimized by concession of the demand for Home Rule. At a time when the Government have availed themselves to answer for the preservation of the semblance of order without imprisoning the ringleaders of the Irish conspiracy, and exactly three days before the murder of two of the Queen's servants in the Phoenix Park, Her Majesty's loyal and devoted subjects at the safe distance of three thousand miles from the centre of disturbance take upon themselves to pray that these gentlemen may be allowed to enjoy the "inestimable blessing of personal liberty." English ideas of loyalty and devotion have certainly suffered an extraordinary inversion in crossing the Atlantic, if they can inspire such reckless and presumptuous interference with problems of whose true character Canadians have little opportunity of informing themselves. The respectful phrases in which these un-called-for resolutions were couched cannot blind anyone to the fact that they amount to a vote of censure upon Her Majesty's Government, and of encouragement to its avowed enemies. We are at a loss to determine whether the circumstances that the Address is simply an electingeering dodge to catch the Irish vote, ought to be regarded as an aggravation of or an excuse for the offence. If the more charitable view be taken, it condemns the Canadian Parliament as guilty of a levity of thought which most seriously detracts from the value of any opinion it may form.

Lord Kimberley has treated this remarkable expression of loyalty and devotion with well-deserved severity. After acknowledging on Her Majesty's behalf the conventional phrase of the exordium, he deals with the Address itself in a single sentence. He says--"Her Majesty will always gladly receive the advice of the Parliament of Canada on all matters relating to the Dominion and the administration of its affairs; but with respect to the question referred to in the Address, Her Majesty will, in accordance with the Constitution of this country, have regard to the advice of the Imperial Parliament and Ministers, to whom all matters relating to the affairs of the United Kingdom exclusively appertain." Official dictation does not often approach so closely to the incisive directness of the domestic mail--"Mind your own business!" but it must be admitted that a statesman rarely has to deal with anything so closely resembling the familiar impudence of the domestic body. We are not aware that Canada has as yet established any such a precedent in the history of her relations to the mother country. The Canadian Parliament is probably a useful body in its own sphere, which may not unjustly be compared to the Metropolitan Board of Works. But if it has produced any prodigy of statesmanlike capacity, the usually energetic colonial transporter must have easily neglected his functions. Colonial parades come over here from time to time to disport themselves in London society. They usually appear more or less impressed with the wholly unfounded notion that Canada has as yet established any right to be taken into account as a nation. They descend with an amusing air of importance upon the burning questions of the day, and to vent all their ill-considered foreign relations at all no domestic problems except of the simplest character. With charming simplicity they will get out of the water on top of the overturned or half-filled boat, and are all drowned except those whom the wrecked craft will support. If they would simply trust the water to sustain 90-100ths of the weight of their body and the disabled boat the other hundredths, they might all be saved under most circumstances. An overturned or water-filled wooden boat will sustain more people in this way than it will carry. It would keep the heads above water of as many people as would be saved under most circumstances. These are simple facts easily learned, and may some day save your life.

How to Keep from Drowning.
The human body weighs a pound in the water, and a chair will carry two grown persons. That is, it will keep the head above water, which is all that is required when it is a question of life and death. One finger placed upon a stool or chair, a small box or piece of board, will easily keep the head above the water, while his feet paddle to propel toward the shore. It is not at all necessary to know how to swim to be able to keep from drowning in this way. A little experience of the buoyant power of water, and faith in it, is all that is required. We have seen small boys who could not swim a stroke, propel himself back and forth across a deep, wide pond by means of a board that would sustain five pounds weight. Children, and all others, should have practice in the sustaining power of water. In nice cases out of ten, the knowledge that a board will sustain a pound weight, is all that is necessary to keep one's head above water, and it will serve better in emergencies than the greatest expertise of a swimmer. A person unfamiliar with the buoyant power of water will naturally try to climb on top of the floating object on which he tries to save himself. If it is large enough to be all right. But it is generally not large enough, and half of a struggling group is often drowned in the desperate scramble of a life and death struggle to climb on top of a piece of weak or other floating object, not large enough to keep them all entirely above water. This often happens when pleasure boats capsizes. All immediately want to get out of the water on top of the overturned or half-filled boat, and are all drowned except those whom the wrecked craft will support. If they would simply trust the water to sustain 90-100ths of the weight of their body and the disabled boat the other hundredths, they might all be saved under most circumstances. These are simple facts easily learned, and may some day save your life.
