NAVY ADEQUATE TO
ENGAGE BRITAIN.

Ambition of Germany Without
Limit.

Forces at Work for Rapid Development of
Navy and Other Powers Will Do Well
Not to be Unprepared—Crisis
for Greatest Fleet Afloat.

LONDON, Aug 12—The Times cor-
respondent at Berlin cables as follows:
—Uncontradicted statements have been
current since the beginning of the
month that the large German battle-
ships which are to be laid down this
year are to have a displacement of
thirteen thousand tons instead of eight-
teen thousand as first proposed, and a
speed of 18.5 knots. The new large
cruisers will have a displacement of
fifteen thousand tons and a speed of
22.5 knots. The German Naval Journal
says that the main armament of the
new battleships is to consist of sixteen
28 centimetre Krupp guns as compared
with ten 30.5 centimetre guns on the
British Dreadnought. A projectile with
a weight of 345 kilograms and a charge
of 132 kilograms will have a muzzle
velocity of 8.4 miles and possess almost
as much penetrating power as a
British projectile with a weight
of 385 kilograms and a charge of
146 kilograms. Thus, at the rate of
one shot per gun per minute, 16 Ger-
man guns could discharge projectiles
weighing 5,520 kilograms, while ten
British guns could discharge 3,850 kilo-
grammes. Moreover, it is estimated
that greater rapidity of fire could be
achieved, the German projectile being
smaller and handier. How far these
statements are accurate it is impos-
sible to say, but there is no mistaking
the activity of the naval authorities. The
first German submarine just launched
at Kiel Canal has been inspected with
a view to enlargement, and the ship-
building and engineering firms are
being carefully tested in order to as-
certain their capacity for production
and expansion.

TO STUDY TURBINES.
Doubtless in order to studies the work-
ing of turbine engines on steamers of
the largest class the senior naval con-
structor has been detailed to make a
voyage from Liverpool to New York on
the 14th instant on the Carmania. Ex-
periments in the German navy with
turbines so far have not been encourag-
ing. There are forces working for the
development of the German navy, and
other powers will do well not to be
unprepared for their success. The
Navy League in no longer a mere
merely for a navy adequate for de-
fensive purposes, but for one able to en-
gage with Great Britain upon equal terms.

FOUND THE BODY OF
WILLIAM H. WEIR

Yacht Scowled Called at Digby on Sat-
day—Death of Hayden
Gupill.

DIGBY, N. S., Aug 12—Indians camp-
ing on the shore in the west side of
Digby Gut discovered the body of a
young man on the fishing beach yester-
day afternoon. Coroner Daley was im-
mediately notified and held an inquest.
The body was identified last night by
William L. Weir, of Annapolis, as that
of his son, William Herbert Weir, who
was drowned while bathing at Annapolis
on Aug. 2.

The funeral takes place tomorrow of
the late Hayden Gupill, who died at
the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. D.
Daley, Friday evening, aged 71. He was
for years interested in the sardine busi-
ness at Grand Mann, Eastport and
elsewhere. He is survived by three
daughters—Mrs. Armstrong, of St.
John; Mrs. A. D. Daley and Miss
Blanche Gupill, of Digby, and one
son, Lloyd Gupill, of Boston.

The steam yacht Scowled, owned by
Commodore Robt. Thomson, of St. John,
arrived here yesterday afternoon with
a party of St. John citizens on board
and sailed again at 8 a. m. today after
a pleasant cruise along the American
and New Brunswick and Nova Scotia
coasts.

PRISONERS HAD BRIEF
FREEDOM FROM DORCHESTER

Two Escaped but Were Soon Captured—
James A. Lane Dead.

DORCHESTER, N. B., Aug 12—Two
convicts in the penitentiary here by
the name of Clarke and Macomber
made a successful bolt for freedom
yesterday afternoon. They were with
a party of prisoners working in the hay
field, being both young and spry they
got beyond pistol shot range before their
intentions were discovered. They were
arrested by Officers Melcand and Mc-
Donald while attempting to board the
Sydney express, No. 19, bound from St.
John to Sydney, at 3.15 a. m. today.
Clarke had less than thirty days to
serve. They were at once placed in the
dungeons to reflect on their folly.
They will have to face the grand jury
at an attempt to escape from prison is
an indictable offence.
