**MEAT EATERS**  
**CONSUME TOO MUCH**

Undereating, However, Has  
Also Its Evils.

Big Eaters In the Best Condition to  
Withstand Disease and Privation,  
Says Prof. Haliburton.

LONDON, Jan. 11.—Prof. Haliburton, lecturing at the Institute of Hygiene, paid a high tribute to the value of meat as a food. He contended that meat-eaters consumed far too much abundant food, and said he was of the opinion that a reduction of meat and alcohol would be a feature of diet in the future. Nevertheless, undereating brought evils as well as excessive eating. The least amount of food was not necessarily the best, and the chances were that big eaters would have better health. The poor in large cities and vegetarians showed less resistance to privation and disease than meat-eaters. This was also shown where a small number of whites dwelt among big native populations in the Far East. It was the white meat-eaters who came to the front and withstood disease and privation better than the natives. The easy digestibility of protein of animal origin rendered them superior to those from vegetables, and the so-called vegetarians had been performing to recognize that by adding to his diet three of the richest products of the animal kingdom, milk, cheese and eggs. Vegetarianism in this sense would doubtless spread if the standard of cooking were raised, but the bad cooking of vegetables rendered them more indigestible, whereas bad cooking of animal food did not possess that disadvantage so markedly. If vegetarians were carried too far there might be horrors more terrible than those of brutality to beasts.

**CHARGED WITH SMUGGLING**  
**TWO RUSSIAN JEWS**

BOSTON, Jan. 11.—William Abbott, of Liverpool, chief steward of the Warren line steamship Sachem, was arrested today by U. S. officers on complaint of Immigration Inspector Parry, who charged Abbott with unlawfully and knowingly landing two Russian Jews at this port on Thursday. When arraigned before Commissioner Hayes late today Abbott pleaded not guilty and was held in \$1,000 bail for a hearing on Monday.

Although he had been in the employ of the company twelve years the men on line officials refused to furnish bail and Abbott was sent to jail. It was alleged that the Hebrews were Jews; that their names were not on the ship's manifest, and that they paid one of the ship's officers \$50.

No trace of the escapee men has yet been found.

**WILL GO AHEAD WITH BUILDING**

Y. M. C. A. Reached Decision  
Last Night.

Tenders Will be Called for Immediately—Exact Location to be Determined Today.

At a joint meeting of the boards of management and trustees of the St. John Y. M. C. A. held last evening in the offices of L. P. D. Tilley, it was definitely decided to call at once for tenders for the new building. The meeting was a rather warm one and did not adjourn until late hour, but the opposition to immediate action was finally overcome with the above result. The following were present: L. P. D. Tilley, president; W. B. Earle, L. H. Somerville, E. L. Rising, Geo. E. Harbour, John Seely, T. B. Blair, George A. Henderson, H. C. Tilley and J. N. Harvey of the trustee board; W. C. Cross, P. A. Dykeman, C. H. Flewelling, J. T. McGowan and W. T. Robson, of the managing board; W. H. Thorne, Judge McLeod and D. B. Donald sent letters expressing regret at their inability to attend, but also expressed the opinion that the erection of the building should be undertaken at once.

After many objections to immediate action had been removed and all opposition silenced, the meeting passed the following resolution: "Resolved, That the plans already presented be completed by a special committee, that tenders for the erection of the building and completion of the same be called for." The meeting also resolved that the association would receive the building absolutely free from debt or lien of any kind and to that effect resolved: "That no more be borrowed on mortgage, thus enabling the building committee to present to the trustees an association building as a free gift." To do this the Y. M. C. A. will have to collect a few thousand dollars more. At present the building committee has in cash and subscriptions as good as \$45,000. This leaves about \$5,000 still to be raised.

The architect, G. E. Fairweather, who was present at the meeting, was given instructions to prepare specifications, and tenders will be called at once. The building will consist of a basement and sub-basement. The two upper stories will be occupied as dormitories, next below will be the assembly room and committee rooms, on the ground floor the parlors, reception rooms and boys' room. In addition will be the bath, lockers and gymnasium, in the sub-basement the bowling alleys.

At 12:45 today the building committee was met on the site and consider the exact location of the edifice. It is very probable that the local Y. M. C. A. will be assisted by the central organization, a letter having been received by L. P. D. Tilley stating that Mr. Budge, a prominent worker in Ontario, will be sent to this city.

**SANE GIRL PRISONER IN LUNATIC ASYLUM**

Immured by Relatives of Her Mistress? Who Resented Latter's Favoritism?

PARIS, Jan. 12.—A young domestic of Dijon, after being kept in an asylum for over two months, has been recognized as completely sane and set at liberty. It appears that the young woman, Clementine, who was confined in the asylum, was the mistress of a man who was a favorite with her mistress, who made her numerous presents. This made the relatives envious, and they are alleged to have taken her off to an asylum.

On the way, however, she succeeded in escape.

A few days later she was sent for by the mayor of Dijon, and while her mistress and legal adviser, who accompanied her, were closeted with the mayor, Clementine was seized and conveyed to the madhouse.

After two months' confinement she was liberated, but ordered to leave Dijon immediately under threat of being arrested as insane.

She, however, has decided to bring an action for illegal detention.

**STAGE MECHANISM REFUSED TO WORK**

Driver and Six Horses Were Thrown a Distance of Twenty Feet.

BERLIN, Jan. 12.—It would seem as though "Circus" accidents were the order of the day here in Germany. The other evening a circus pantomime "Rome," a charioter executed a so-called "death ride," in which a chariot and four horses were driven across a bridge of twenty feet to the ground. The driver and the animals escaped serious injury almost as if by a miracle.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or a single man over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father (or mother).

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
