THAW FIGHTING FOR HIS FREEDOM

Habeas Corpus Proceedings Commence
Today—Opposed by District
Attorney Jerome.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., May 2.—Public interest in the case of Harry K. Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, will be revived tomorrow morning when Thaw will begin a fight in habeas corpus proceedings to secure his release from the Matteawan State Hospital for insane criminals.

The writ of habeas corpus is returnable before Justice Morschauser in the supreme court in this city tomorrow morning at 10.30.

The writ was issued by Judge Morschauser, at White Plains on April 22 on the application of James G. Graham, an attorney of Newburgh and former secretary to former Governor B. O'Dell, who figures for the first time for the Thaw case in these proceedings.

District Attorney Jerome of New York County, will oppose the proceedings and endeavor to prevent the discharge of Thaw, whom he believes to be insane.

The first step in the court proceedings will be a motion by Mr. Jerome to have the trial transferred to New York County. Mr. Jerome thinks it will be more convenient for witnesses to have the trial in New York.

If Mr. Jerome carries this point, it will be a departure from the usual custom as most habeas corpus proceedings involving patients confined in Matteawan are tried here.

Thaw will be brought to Poughkeepsie tomorrow morning by Dr. Baker, acting superintendent of the institution, and two attendants.

Dr. Baker will testify that Thaw is not mentally fit to give his liberty. Other insanity experts who have examined Thaw will be put on the stand by District Attorney Jerome. Among the experts retained by Thaw's attorney to testify as to his mental condition are Dr. Charles H. Pilgrim, superintendent of the Hudson River State Hospital and Dr. Charles H. Lane, of Poughkeepsie.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 2.—Mrs. Wm. Thaw, mother of Harry Thaw, now endeavoring to obtain his release from Matteawan Asylum for the criminal insane, issued a statement today relative to the rumors that she was opposing her son's release. The statement, from Colonel Bartlett read:

"I am authorized by Mrs. Wm. Thaw to say that the statement to the effect that the Thaw family is opposed to Harry Thaw's release, are without foundation. While it is not necessary for them to take any active part in the matter, nevertheless, they are all in full sympathy with him. At no time has Mrs. Wm. Thaw been reconciled to her son's detention in Matteawan but the summary order of the court was so swiftly carried out that there was no opportunity for remonstrance against committing an acquitted man to an asylum for the criminal insane. It has been Mrs. Wm. Thaw's desire that her son should accompany her to Europe and for this reason, she has at the moment reluctantly endured until the present time."

BRIEF DESPATCHES.

MALDEN, Mass., May 2.—Albert Harding, 20 years old, and single, was found dead of gas poisoning today in his room in the house on Mountain avenue, where he boarded. The medical examiners who held an autopsy tonight were unable to decide whether it was a case of suicide or accident. Harding was employed as a shipping clerk.

LAKEWOOD, N. J., May 2.—The condition of former president, Grover Cleveland, who is said by his physicians to be suffering from acute indigestion, continues to show daily improvement, according to Mrs. Cleveland, who expresses the hope that the progress of her husband's recovery may permit an early return to Governor's office.

BOSTON, Mass., May 2.—Governor Curtis Guild, Jr., who has been seriously ill for some weeks past has so far recovered that he was able today to be down stairs and spend the Sunday with his family. The governor and Mrs. Guild are planning to go to their summer home at Nahant next week, Thursday, to remain through the summer.

CAIRO, Egypt, May 2.—A British subject, Scott Moncreiff, deputy inspector of the Blue Nile province, together with a native official, has been assassinated at the instance of a local sheik, who proclaimed himself prophet at Mesalamieh, about one hundred and fifty miles from Khartoum. A small punitive force, led by the governor of the province, was attacked by a murderous band of desperadoes. During the fighting the governor was wounded and two native officers were killed.

ALTOONA, Pa., May 2.—Four Italian laborers were killed and three seriously injured today by the caving in of a trench which was being dug for a sewer in this city. The trench, which was ten feet deep, was supported by timbers, but recent rains loosened the earth and the timbers giving way suddenly, tons of dirt fell upon the workers. Three of the men were dug out alive but the other four were dead when discovered.

THE KOREAN SITUATION

IS GROWING WORSE

Newspapers Suppressed—Armed Bands

Making Trouble—Missionaries Threatened.

SEOUL, May 4.—The Residency has just issued some stringent regulations directed against the Japanese, Korean and foreign-owned vernacular newspapers. It proposes to confiscate these journals to prevent the circulation of inflammatory articles. The insurgents are at present preventing the natives from bringing in wood for fuel and vegetables into Seoul, Chemulpo, Fusan and other towns. They lie in wait on the highways, confiscate the goods and frequently kill the farmers.

Yesterday small bands of marauders, twenty or thirty strong, furlished a highway from a hill one mile outside of Seoul. They scattered promptly, however, when an armed party was sent out against them. Another evidence of the unrest is found in the fact that two American missionaries recently received letters threatening them with death if they aided the government against the insurgents. The casualties in the recent encounter with the armed bands have been, however, insignificant. The forces of unrest operate in small bands seldom exceeding ten, and when they are pursued they scatter and hide themselves. The Japanese soldiers have committed a number of acts of injustice, these have aroused intense indignation and have afforded grounds for the continuance of the anti-Japanese agitation. The government now proposes that they should police the entire country. The reinforcements to this end, probably will amount to 800 men, including some 40 Koreans, who make good policemen.

While commerce and trade are practically still here and other towns, considerable building and general improvement work is going forward. The Japanese population is increasing rapidly.
