CAPT. W. E. FORBES'S BEST ALL ROUND SHOT OF THE YEAR

SUSSEX, N. B., Aug. 21.—Today was the final day of the P. R. A. meeting for 1908. The conditions for shooting were perhaps a little improved, but the high westerly wind continued to spoil many scores.  
This morning the Fowler match was shot, seven shots at 500 and 900 yards. The prize for this match is a silver cup, presented by G. W. Fowler, M. P. for Kings County. It was won this year by Major O. W. Wetmore, with the score of 65.  
In the afternoon the Pigeon cup was competed for. This is a silver cup presented by the Honorable William Pugsley. The match is shot over the 900 yard range and ten shots are fired. The cup was won by H. A. Chandler of Moncton, with a total of 45 points.  
The grand aggregate is made up of the scores made in the Dominion, Prince of Wales, association, McLean, ladies and Fowler matches. First place in grand aggregate represents the best all-round shot of year's meeting. It was won this year by last year's winner, Capt. W. E. Forbes. The first prize includes the D. B. silver medal, badge and \$10.  
The second prize, P. R. A. silver medal and \$5, was won by Sergt. J. T. Sullivan.  
Third prize, D. R. A. bronze medal and \$7, was won by H. A. Chandler of Moncton.  
The twenty highest marksmen in the grand aggregate shoot for the governor's general's medals. This match is shot at 300 yards and ten shots are fired. In conjunction with this match and under the same conditions the second stage of the Robertson championship is fired.  
The highest twenty in the grand aggregate were: Capt. W. E. Forbes, Sergt. J. T. Sullivan, H. A. Chandler, Capt. J. S. Frost, Major G. S. Kinnear, H. R. Jardine, F. Price, Lieut. D. R. Chandler, Sergt. E. W. White, Capt. J. S. Frost, Major G. S. Kinnear, Capt. E. A. Smith, Sergt. J. T. Downey, Sergt. H. H. Bartlett.  
The Governor-General's silver medal was won by Lieut. D. R. Chandler, with the score of 45 points. A. J. Jardine and Sergt. J. T. Sullivan tied for the bronze medal with 42 points each.  
The Robertson championship, which carries with it \$50 in money, was also won by Lieut. D. R. Chandler. Lieut. Chandler's scores were: First stage, 87; second stage, 46.  
Second place and \$25 was won by Sergt. E. P. Glavin, Mr. Glavin's score in the first stage was 86, in the second 28.

BRITISH CONSUL GAVE UP KOREAN EDITOR  
SEOUL, Aug. 21.—The British Consul General today unconditionally surrendered to the Korean authorities the editor of the Vernacular edition of the Daily News, who escaped from the police August 18, and sought refuge in the house of E. F. Bethel, the English newspaper of the paper.
