

THOROUGHBRED SENT TO STATES TO RACE

But This Government Importation Met With an Accident

An interesting question which is exercising the minds of some persons in the city is whether or not the regulation governing the sale of the government's importation of horses last spring prevent the racing of the horses outside New Brunswick. The importation was made for the purpose of improving the breed of horses in this province and the animals were supposed to be kept in the province. It is quite generally known, however, that one of the imported thoroughbreds was sent to New England by a gentleman closely connected with the making of the importation, for the purpose of racing during the present season. The plan miscarried, however, as the horses received injuries which made it impossible to race. The animal was then brought back. It is said that a Halifax man was acting as the trainer of the horse.
