

# Marathons Took Both of the Holiday Games from St. John

## The Largest Crowds of the Season Found Much to Interest Them on the Marathon Grounds on Saturday Afternoon -- Calais Defeated St. Stephen and Woodstock Won from Fredericton.

The Marathons walked away with two exhibition ball games on Saturday from the St. John. In the morning game the score was nine to one, and in the afternoon six to four. It is an assured fact that baseball is pleasing the public this season as the crowds at the Saturday games were the largest yet seen. At the morning game there was in the vicinity of 500 people, while three thousand persons crowded their way into the grounds in the afternoon. The large grand stand was crowded to overflowing, and all the private boxes were occupied, and hundreds of people were watching the game from the greater part of the games presented good fast playing.

In the morning game Paquette was in the box for the St. John. He was found for only eight hits he was not steady, and gave the first two runs by wild pitches. The team was also off and rolled up no less than nine errors.

Winter was in the box for the Marathons and pitched a steady game. The St. John's manager to get eight hits of his delivery, one being a three bagger by Sabourin in the sixth.

The St. John's were first to bat. Ramsey opened with a single to centre, stole second and advanced a base on Mulvey's single to centre. Winter threw badly to first base and Ramsey scored. This was the only run made by the St. John's in the game.

For the Marathons Winter singled to left, stole second, and reached third when Lewis threw to fifth when there was no person there to receive the ball. Paquette then made a wild pitch and Winter scored.

In the second inning Connelly was hit by pitched ball, error by Mahoney allowed Fraser to reach first and he went to second on Winter's out, second to first. Williams fled to right field, Duggan hit by pitched ball who missed and Fraser scored. Riley hit safe to centre and Donnelly went to third. A muff by Clifford on second allowed the runner to reach safely. The game an error by Mulvey on third which allowed Riley and Donnelly to score.

The Marathons were blanked in the fourth inning but managed to get in another run in the fifth. Winter met the ball on the seam for a two base hit, went to third on Williams' fly out to centre and scored when Donnelly fled out to left.

In the sixth inning Nelson was hit by a pitched ball and advanced to second on Malcolm's error. Connelly hit safe to centre and stole second, Nelson going to third. Fraser followed with a two base hit to left field and Nelson and Connelly scored.

The ninth and last run was made in the eighth inning. Connelly got a single to centre and advanced to base on Nesbitt's single to left. Fraser fled out to the pitcher and Nesbitt was doubled out at first; and while this was going on Connelly reached third base. Winter hit to Clifford who missed and Connelly brought in the run.

Afternoon Game. The afternoon game was a far better exhibition than that of the morning and was a hard fight from start to finish. Tarbell pitched for the Marathons, and while his support was not the best at times, he was found for only six hits and struck out twelve men. Ford was in the box for the St. John's, and while he pitched a

steady game the Greeks landed on his delivery for thirteen safe ones. Williams did not play his usual good game, he making a few bad misses; Winter was also off in a couple of plays, but on the whole these two men played an excellent baseball. For the first two innings the St. John's were retired quickly. For the Marathons Winter made the first run in the first inning. He reached first on a single to right, and went to second on an error of ball and scored on an error of Mahoney.

In the third inning each team made a run. For the St. John's two men out Ford reached first on Williams error; Ramsey drew a base on balls; Dolan hit safe to left field, and scored when Ramsey was caught out at the plate.

For the Marathons Lynch hit safe to left and went to second on Fraser's sacrifice, and scored when Winter singled to centre field.

In the fourth inning for the St. John's Sabourin got a two bagger to right, Bruneau hit to Williams who missed and Sabourin scored.

The ball went up in this inning for the Greeks, and they made three runs. With one out the Marathons drew a base on balls and advanced on Tarbell's sacrifice. Malcolm singled to left and stole second while Lynch hit to centre and scored.

In the sixth inning the Marathons got a two bagger to centre field and scored. Third on Mulvey's error. Lynch singled to centre and Malcolm scored; a bad throw of Dolan allowed Lynch to reach third and he scored when Fraser singled to left. Winter struck out and retired the side.

There was no run getting in the fifth although the Greeks had three strikes. In the sixth the Marathons managed to roll in another run. Malcolm got a two bagger to centre field and scored. Third on Mulvey's error. Lynch singled to centre and Malcolm scored. The next three men up were retired quickly. This was all the runs made by the Marathons.

In the seventh inning the St. John's managed to make two runs. Mahoney got a two bagger to left; Britt drew a base on balls; Clifford hit to Winter who missed and he scored. Tarbell made a wild pitch allowing Mahoney to score, and the other two men advanced a base. Ford fled out to first and scored.

It looked as if the St. John's might score in the eighth. An error of Williams and two singles filled the bases. The Marathons sent in as a pinch hitter there were two men out and a hit meant a couple of runs. Tarbell, however, took things coolly and managed to strike like Lewis out and retired the side.

The St. John's were retired quickly in the ninth inning and the game was over. The Marathons won by the score of 4 to 4. Dan Connelly and George Stubbs umpired. Some of Connelly's decisions were very questionable.
