INTERESTING CASE IN CIRCUIT COURT.

The case of J. Charles Salmon vs. Raymond & Doherty, Ltd., proprietors of the Royal Hotel, was commenced yesterday morning in the Circuit Court (adjourned September sittings) before Mr. Justice McKewen and the following jury—Wm. George Dunlop, Fred. M. Keston, Wellington Green, Edward Evans, Joseph Craig, Clifford Ellis and George Keele.

This is an action to recover about \$1,500 damages for breach of contract. The defendants contracted with the plaintiff, it is alleged, on January 15, 1911, whereby the plaintiff as manager of the Globe Laundry, was to launder the Royal Hotel's flat pieces at a flat rate of \$1,500 per year and thirty-five cents per hundred for all in excess of 350,000. The plaintiff alleges that the defendants never paid him any of their work, so they claim damages for breach of contract.

At yesterday's proceedings Mr. Salmon and W. B. Tennant, a director of the Globe Laundry testified and shortly before five o'clock the plaintiff's case was closed.

The defendant opened for the defendant and Fred Wright, head waiter at the Royal Hotel testified. The case will be resumed this morning.

John B. M. Baxter, K. C. appeared for the plaintiff and M. G. Teed, K. C. for the defendant.

NOT BAD WEATHER HERE AFTER ALL

Weather Bureau Official Points Out that November, 1912, is Improvement on Same Month in Other Years.

Following Sunday, which was the coldest November day for several years, the mercury took a rise yesterday and the coldest experienced in St. John was the 13th of the month. A review of the records for several years, shows that the householder, with the high price of coal starting him in the face, may well congratulate himself that he has escaped bitter blasts even in comparison with other years.

D. L. Hutchinson points out that one year ago yesterday St. John experienced a flurry of snow following a week wherein the temperature was changeable to the extent of an average of 13 degrees a day. This year for the past week, local people have not been subjected to extreme changes in the mercury, the mercury tallying at an average of less than seven degrees daily.

ANOTHER NEW INDUSTRY.

The following letter was received from the Dominion Tar and Chemical Company, which has works at Sydney, N. S., Sault Ste Marie, Ontario, and Truro, Nova Scotia. Drummond McCall informs us that they are contemplating the erection of coke ovens on a site adjacent to the harbor of St. John. If their scheme should come through, we would wish to apply to you for a grant of about 10 acres of land adjoining their site for the purpose of erecting tar distilling works, including creosote pits, benzol, ammonia, carbolic acid, and various other products of the tar series, should it ultimately become feasible to erect a creosoting plant for the treatment of railway ties and other timber we should require another 30 or 40 acres. We shall be very glad to get into communication with you or your representative personally in the near future and either our general manager at Montreal, or the manager of our plant at Sydney personally will suit your convenience as to an appointment.

"Signed" HAROLD BOULTON. The mayor said that in 1908 when the Harbord Commission recommended that the city acquire the Barrack Green, the then Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Mr. W. L. Martin would favor selling all the government land not in use for militia purposes. He had written to Hon. Sam Hughes about the matter recently but had received no reply.

There was a good deal of talk about new industries, sites were needed. The McAvity's would have to get room for enlargement or lease from the city. It is thought the city would be justified in spending a considerable sum to reclaim 27 acres which it owned south of the Barrack wharf. It would provide a site for the McAvity's and the tar industry too.

The matter dropped.

PUBLIC SAFETY MATTERS.

Com. McLellan recommended that the several vacancies on the police force be filled upon condition that the appointments were satisfactory to him. This was adopted.

In recommending the appointment of W. J. Dawes as assistant market clerk, Com. McLellan said he intended later on to have him act as outside collector of tolls. He did not think the tolls had been collected properly for years, and by using Mr. Dawes' services outside as well as in, he hoped to increase the market revenues.

MINOR BUSINESS.

On motion of Com. Schofield it was decided to sell at auction on the 22nd inst., the fee simple in Lot No. 753 fronting on the north side of Duke street, Queen's ward, and to allow the Norton Griffiths Dredging Company and the Beaver Dredging Co. a space of 100 feet on the top of North Rodney wharf at a rental of \$250 a year.

George Robinson was authorized to erect a electric flash light globe over the sidewalk at No. 121 Union street, west.

Moses and Steves were awarded the contract for excavating DeMonts' street at \$25 per foot for rock and 60 cents for earth.

Com. Agar gave notice of motion to issue debentures to the amount of \$50,000 to pay off the following accounts: Charlotte street pavement, \$14,000; King street pavement, \$10,275; Marsh Bridge Abolition, \$8,580; restoration of South Rodney wharf, \$3,146; purchase of improvements on Gordon lot, \$6,980; Purchase of improvements Slesch, Quinlan and \$8,895; Curzon street sewer, \$3,600; St. John street sewer, \$600; Main street sewer, \$5,600; Hazen alley sewer, \$1,500.

Mr. Agar said that of this amount \$36,000 was chargeable to the commissioners' expenditure, and the balance to the obligations assumed from the old council.

Com. Agar also gave notice of motion to issue \$7,000 worth of short term debentures to pay the balance of the bill for improving Germain street. These will bear interest at 4 1/2 per cent, and \$1,000 will be retired each year.

The mayor expressed regret at the death of W. H. Dunham, clerk of the market, and spoke appreciatively of his long service to the city. Council then adjourned.
