Preacher of the Union sermon for 1916—Rev. R. J. Houghton of St. John.

A most carefully prepared and interesting address by the chairman, Rev. W. J. Bevis, B.A., Sheffield, N.B., marked the proceedings of the Congregational Union last evening. The meeting opened with a praise service led by Rev. W. J. Bevis. Mr. Cox addressed his audience on "The Church and the Good News of Humanity's Regeneration."

In the course of his remarks, he referred to the establishment of the Church of God in Palestine and the surrounding country by Christ and His apostles. He traced the history of the church in England and Northern Europe through the dark ages. The salvation of Northern Europe was only affected through the power of the Reformation and the efforts of such men as Wycliffe and Luther, by saturating the people with their doctrines and bible.

The mission to the deep sea fishermen in Labrador was only made possible by the heroic and sacrificial efforts of Wm. Greffell. The regeneration of America was brought about by the inspiring words of Wycliffe.

"The word of God is still the true means of regeneration," said the speaker. "Our task is the regeneration of the whole world. God is with us. We are His instruments. When the pastors cease to preach then it is time for Christ to reappear and claim the sovereignty of His people."

Challenge of the Church. Rev. C. C. Cairns of Brooklyn, (N.S.) gave an interesting address on "The Challenge of the Church." He emphasized the fact that only with men, such as the sacrifices being made in the great war struggle today, will the church be able to Christianize the heathen masses waiting for the knowledge and call of Christ.

The morning session opened with a praise service led by M. E. Turple. The reports of the nominating committee were presented. These showed Rev. W. J. D. Gibson, Rev. C. C. Cairns, Rev. H. T. Wright, Mr. C. H. Beattie, Mr. W. E. Turple as members of the business committee.

The report of the treasurer, Mr. Chas. MacMichael, for year 1914-15, showed that the balance on hand and deposited amounted to \$341.38.

Reports. A report from the statistical secretary was submitted, in which he stated that this was the first year in his experience that reports had been sent in by all the churches. His report gave a complete statement of the number of churches, Sunday schools, members and valuation of church property in the Union. The number of churches and out stations is 28 with 11 pastors in charge, representing a constituency of 2,500 people, while the number of church members is 839.

There are 15 Sunday schools including two union schools, which have 106 teachers and an average attendance of 489.

The number of young people's societies reported is 6, with 152 members. The church property includes 18 church buildings and 11 parsonages, the valuation of which is about \$85,000. This property is mostly protected by insurance, although 3 churches and 1 parsonage are reported not insured.

The amount of indebtedness on the church property is \$1,350.

The amount of money raised shows an increase over the previous year, both in money for local work and denominational purposes. The total amount raised was \$12,845.

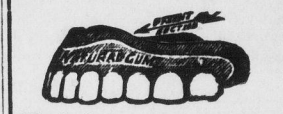

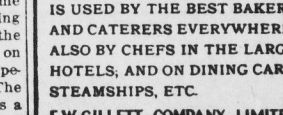

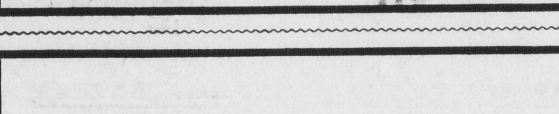
