EPIDEMIC OF TYPHOID FEVER IN DORCHESTER

Dorchester, N. B., Sept. 25—Dorchester citizens are alarmed over an epidemic of fever which has broken out here and there are today some forty or fifty cases in the city.

The board of health had with them as consulting physician Dr. W. A. Ferguson of Moncton and Dr. Dunlap of St. John, a bacteriologist, and who took samples of milk to be analyzed by him on his return to St. John.

The board of health before a meeting of the citizens of the town held in the court house, this afternoon announced that after a careful diagnosis they were prepared to announce that it was typhoid fever.

Several new cases have broken out today but it is hoped with the co-operation of the board of health the disease may be got under control.

The death occurred here today of J. Percy Foster, chief trade instructor at the Dorchester Penitentiary of typhoid fever. He had been ill for about two weeks and was born at Kingston (Ont.), October 12, 1874.
