THE President and Directors of the above  
named institution, in order to liquidate the  
debts of said building, and to transfer the

stand this: We should think not, unless  
our debt be increased also. We do not  
consider this scheme as Better  
Terms, but as a subtle opening up of the  
basis of Union that will enable us to go  
in and secure our rights. As such it is,  
if our correspondent has not been  
advised, or if we have not understood  
his telegram, a great step  
towards the readjustment of our financial  
arrangements with Canada. We must  
get \$100,000 a year additional  
revenue.

THE Ministerial crisis in London still  
continues. Mr. Gladstone has resigned,  
but Mr. Disraeli doesn't seem anxious  
to attempt the formation of a Ministry.  
The Queen's prompt acceptance of Mr.  
Gladstone's resignation shows that she  
is not particularly desirous of his re-  
covering his position. There is also  
altogether too much sectarianism involved  
in the cause of the Ministry for the  
Queen to desire a dissolution  
to take place, and she will not dissolve  
the House if such a course can be avoided.  
Then there is the impending  
motion of confidence in the Government.  
We should not be at all surprised if the  
motion were carried by a fair majority.  
This would soothe the Ministerial  
difficulties and induce them to remain in  
office a while longer. The Tories are  
gaining strength in the country every  
day, and Mr. Disraeli will act wisely by  
permitting Mr. Gladstone to conduct  
the Government in a struggling and  
embarrassed way for some time to come.

It is interesting to note that Mr.  
Humphrey, who polled every Orange  
vote in Westmoreland, voted with Mr.  
Landry, Dr. Alward and Mr. Napier to  
deny the Orange Society the right to  
hold property. He thinks this will in-  
gratiate him with the Catholics and  
weaken him very little with the Protestants.  
Next election will show that he  
will get the votes of neither. The man  
who deserts those who put him in a position  
of trust is despised by his former  
friends as a traitor and by his new allies  
as a dupe. Pass him along.

to understand how Mr. Speaker Nail

FREDERICTON, March 12th, 1873.  
THE SPEAKER RESPYLED.  
The minority that prevailed during the  
present session and characteristic of  
the first part of every session was sud-  
denly changed yesterday. The halls and  
galleries were made to resound with the  
enthusiasm so characteristic of a desper-  
ate struggle.

The apple of discord was thrown down  
by Mr. Beckwith in reference to the man-  
ner in which the petitions to oppose  
Fredericton assessment were got up.  
The remarks were quite uncalculated for  
the impression that the question was  
to be decided not upon the merits of the  
case but by dragging in an influence  
which was sure to give a majority.  
But we have heard this kind of thing  
before, and we are not surprised to find  
that the majority of the House, which  
is composed of the Irish and Scotch  
Catholics in an able speech, which, al-  
though foreign to the question at issue,  
was warmly admitted by all. It is to  
be regretted that such matters as involve  
the interest of a community could not be  
settled apart from the School Law and  
party feeling. The School question will  
be before the House during the session.  
Already numerous signed petitions have  
been presented praying for amendments,  
and we know how it ended. It is the  
blistering of a few, while the rest of the  
majority are silent. Can'te commanding the  
waves to recede from his foot, and he  
was a type of the folly. To every ob-  
jector of the bill, to every objector  
even now well known if the Free School  
bill were now under consideration. The  
Government have distinctly said that if  
any change be made it will affect only  
the principle of Schools Act.  
And having said, with a good majority,  
will they not do?

Legislative Notes.  
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Ship Dauntless, Wilbur, master, at  
New York from Liverpool, reports, had  
line N. and N. W. winds until 13th, lat.  
48.46 lon 17.01, from thence to the east-  
ern edge of the Banks, and W. and S. S. W.  
winds, with a low barometer, 18th,  
lat 50.30, lon. 51.40 had an S. W. gale and  
was beset by a heavy sea, which car-  
ried away two quarter boats and a por-  
tion of the guard rail around the cabin;  
4th, lat 40.20, lon. 65, had a gale from S.  
W. and W.; barometer went down to 28.  
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The ship Algoma.—Captain Carry, of  
the ship Algoma, of Halifax, from Ant-  
werp, for New York, has been accused of  
carrying away by force from the former  
port, several seamen belonging to the  
French schooner L'Africaine. An investi-  
gation into the affair has been set on  
foot, and the Consul-General of France  
at New York advised of the circumstances  
and instructed to watch for the arrival of  
the Algoma.

The Schooner Annis E. Pye master,  
from New York for this port, with a  
general cargo, put into Head Harbor dur-  
ing the gale of Monday last. The follow-  
ing morning she proceeded, and on the  
same evening anchored off Musquash  
Harbor. That night it blew a hurricane,  
the wind shifting from E. S. E. to South,  
a high sea running. About 1 o'clock one  
of her cables parted, the other while par-  
tially shortened, previous to shipping, par-  
ted, when the vessel drifted rapidly in to-  
ward the shore; an effort was made to  
run her inside of the Island, but the tide  
ran her inside of the Island, and she was  
about half a mile over the flats, where she  
thumped heavily, tearing away her cut-  
water, bobstay and plate; her forefoot is  
gone and keel considerably chafed.  
The time of her striking the mud made  
water, but is now perfectly dry, the mud  
having lightened her. Captain Pye hav-  
ing succeeded in bringing her up with the  
kedge, came to this port, and having  
secured the assistance of the tugboat  
Dirigo, succeeded in getting her off, when  
she was towed to this port, arriving at 3  
o'clock yesterday afternoon. She now  
lays at the North Wharf, where she will  
be discharged cargo. The A. E. is owned by  
Captains Pye, Messrs. Stevens Bros. and  
S. Leonard.

Runaway.  
A pair of spirited horses, anxious for a  
gallop, belonging to Mr. Wilson, team-  
ster, ran up King street in the style this  
forenoon. After turning into Charlotte  
street they collided with a country team,  
whose driver was suddenly placed hors de  
combat, and were stopped in their mad  
career just in time to save more damage.

A New Enterprise.  
Mr. Murphy, who will have a working  
operation at his Cotton Mills, in the  
course of a month or more, a large num-  
ber of Looms, which is his importing.  
The carrying proprietor expects to  
carry on a brisk business in weaving,  
this being the first introduction of that  
branch of business into this country.

Auction Sales.  
Messrs. Lockhart & Chipman were the  
only men who had any business before  
them to-day. Their salesroom was  
crowded by buyers anxious for bargains  
in groceries, of which a large variety was  
offered. The sales were large and the  
bidding lively.

Professing a Pistol.  
A dispute occurred in a liquor saloon  
in this city a few evenings since, about  
paying for the drinks. One of the men  
threatened to put a "wooden ear" on his  
companion, and the other said he would  
put a bullet through him in less than no  
time, and produced the weapon to do  
with. The proprietor of the place had  
considerable difficulty in quieting the  
combatants. Firearms, notwithstanding  
the law, are carried to a great extent in  
this city.

City Police Court.  
A poor unfortunate female, Jane Hill by  
name, who was found drunk and bar-  
fouled on Prince William street, was  
sent to the Provincial Penitentiary for  
two months.

Perilous Police Court.  
Wm. Murphy, Samuel Brookings, John  
Adams, Joseph Scerber, quite young lads,  
who have persistently been guilty of  
snow-balling in the streets of Portland,  
were complained of, and this morning  
tried and fined \$2 each. Their parents  
will pay the fines, and they were making  
the Station ring with their laughter when  
locked up, seeming to think it a good  
joke.

Wreck Removed.—The Board of Com-  
missioners of Pilots have been notified  
that the wreck of "Sandy Hook," which  
for some time has been a serious im-  
peditment to navigation, has been removed  
to a depth of twenty-five and a half feet  
at mean low water.

The bark Fredonia, Burke, Master, at  
Boston 11th inst. 33 days from Fayal,  
reports that that port on the 6th ult.,  
bank N. K. Clements, Kelly Master, from  
London for Boston with general cargo,  
(before reported in distress) would be re-  
paired and ready to proceed about the  
latter end of February; the P. also re-  
ports, on the 18th ult., was within 4 days  
sail of Boston. Then took heavy west-  
erly gales, with terrific squalls of hail and  
rain. Was 17 days between lon. 26.30  
and 66, during which time it blew away  
three lower topsails and fore-sails, and  
split other sails.

Parliament of Canada.  
Special to the Tribune.  
The Illegal Petition Presented by the  
"Legal Leader of the Opposition"  
is ruled Out—Our Better Terms  
Claims to be Settled in Connection  
with Ontario and Quebec's Arbitra-  
tion Difficulties—Mayor Reed  
Coming Back to look after his Re-  
election—Reading Up the Pacific  
Railway Debate—Manitoba is  
Quiet.

OTTAWA, March 14.  
Mr. Langevin's Report on the Public  
Works, Dr. Tupper's Report on Trade  
and Navigation, Mr. Tilly's Report on  
the Public Accounts, and the Pacific Rail-  
way charter and correspondence, were  
laid on the table yesterday afternoon.  
Mr. Mackenzie wanted to know if all the  
correspondence had been submitted, and  
was informed by the Premier that he had  
a few private letters that were not among  
the papers, but Mr. Mackenzie could have  
them if he wished. Sir John then moved  
that the documents be printed for the use  
of the House.

The South Renfrew election case was  
brought up by Mr. Blake, who recounted  
in detail the allegations telegraphed you  
yesterday, and instead of standing on his  
former ground of summary action, moved  
that the petition be referred to the Election  
committee. If he had moved, as was ex-  
pected, that the returns be amended and  
McDougal admitted, he would have been  
much more badly beaten than he was on  
the Peterborough case. Mr. Hilyard  
Cameron argued that the motion to refer  
the petition was out of order, inasmuch  
as the law required that recognitions to  
proceed must be attached to petitions  
against a member's return, and the law  
had not been complied with in this in-  
stance. Mr. Blake claimed that the ob-  
jection was of no weight now that the  
petition had been received. The Premier  
made a speech on the law points in-  
volved, pointing out the gross  
violation of constitutional law and Par-  
liamentary practice attempted by Mr.  
Blake, and said he wanted these cases  
promptly settled but that they must be  
dealt with in a legal and proper way. The  
Speaker decided the statute had not been  
complied with, that the petition had  
been illegally brought before the House,  
and that no action whatever could be  
taken on it. The humiliated "Leader of  
the Opposition on legal questions" then  
moved, and Sir John assented, that the  
poll books be referred to the Election  
Committee and the Returning Officer  
summoned to answer charges of fraud.

In the Senate there has been much  
grumbling at the loss of the gay and gra-  
cious Minister of Marine, several mem-  
bers declaring that his transfer to the  
Commons had lowered the dignity of the  
Senate. The Postmaster General an-  
nounced that a measure for equalizing  
the salaries of Supreme Court Judges  
was under consideration. Senator Ed-  
ford carried a motion for an investigation  
into the E. & N. A. and Intercolonial rail-  
ways.

This is all the business that was done  
yesterday.  
The New Brunswick members had an  
enthusiastic Better Terms conference  
yesterday. Mr. Tilly and Mr. Mitchell  
attending and promoting their active  
cooperation. Even Mr. Donville  
who sneered at Better Terms at  
Judge Pugsley's Hampton dinner and  
at George Warner's Washington dinner, has  
fallen into line with the others. This  
is accepted as a guarantee that the Govern-  
ment are now really sincere in their pro-  
fession of an intention to do us justice.  
They could not oppose our claims after  
the position Mr. Palmer's politic speech  
in seconding the address placed them in,  
and there is now no doubt of agreeing on  
and carrying through a fair measure of  
financial relief for New Brunswick.

The rumors of serious trouble in Mani-  
toba are untrue.  
Senator McEllan and wife arrived  
yesterday. Mayor Reed and wife leave  
for St. John to-day.  
Opposition are making great prepara-  
tions for the Pacific Railway debate, read-  
ing everything from the True Patriotist  
to the London Times. Mackenzie is  
making a new scrap book for extracts on  
the subject.  
Cockburn, of West Peterboro, will take  
his seat to-day, subject to petitions  
against him.  
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Moncton News.  
[From the Times.]  
Mr. O'Brien, of St. John, will lecture in  
the Catholic Chapel of this town on next  
Tuesday evening; subject, "Father  
Matthew."  
A new school house has been contracted  
for by the Trustees of Schools in Irish-  
town, to cost \$148.36. Mr. Isaac Turner  
is the contractor. The old school build-  
ing at this place (Larriette's) was burned  
down last fall.  
On Tuesday of last week, the store of  
Grant, Sutherland & Co., railway con-  
tractors, at Gallagher's Ridge, about 15  
miles from Moncton, caught fire accidentally  
and the building and its contents  
were destroyed. The building was insur-  
ed for \$50, and the stock for \$8,500, both  
in the "Queen" office.

Driving a Family into a Barn and then Set-  
ting the Building on Fire.  
A barn belonging to Mr. Green, at  
Rothsley, was burned last night. It was  
rumored that Green drove his family out  
of the house and they took refuge in the  
barn, which he afterwards set fire to. The  
family escaped, but a colt and other con-  
tents were consumed.
