

Gananoque, I was informed, that, after preaching a few times, I need not expect to have over a dozen hearers. This prediction, however, has not proved true, as in Gananoque, where we have had, with few exceptions, preaching every Sabbath, our congregations are large, respectable, and very attentive; and it affords me much gratification to say, that I have always found the Rev. Henry Gordon, pastor of the Presbyterian congregation in this village, the affable gentleman, and the zealous and affectionate Christian. There are six regular appointments every two weeks, at each of which, with one exception, a week evening appointment; the congregations are large, and very attentive. There are five classes, each furnished with a class-book. The appointments are so arranged as to enable me to be at a Prayer Meeting in Gananoque every Friday evening. This, however, I regret to say, is not as well attended as I should wish. There are a few on this Circuit, calling themselves Methodists, not attached to the societies under our charge; but I am fully satisfied that a great majority of the inhabitants are favourable, in their views, of the course pursued by the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada. I have reason to know, that the principles and doctrines of Christianity, as taught through the economy and influence of Methodism, are becoming more and more favourably received and permanently fixed in the minds and hearts of many. Since my stay on the Circuit, embracing the period from July 29, 1841, to the present date, I have sold one set of Clarke's Commentary, 24 of our Music Books, 96 of our Hymn Books, besides quite a variety of other useful and standard works, Catechisms, Almanacs, &c., furnished by our useful Book Establishment. I have preached 468 times; held four Watch Nights; officiated at all the Quarterly Meetings for the last two years; baptized 128 individuals, adults and infants; and solemnized matrimony between 23 couple. The financial returns may not appear as favourable as could have been desired; for which, however, there are causes, known only to those who are intimately acquainted with the Circuit. The funds will naturally increase, and the Circuit should, at all events, be continued. The space of country lying between Kingston and the Elizabethtown Circuit is important, and should never be abandoned by the Canada Conference.
