It is nct in, save to those whose eyes are either fixed on worldly things, filled with unbelieving tears. It is not uncertain; the promises God in Christ are yea and Amen; and "the Lord God will ipe away tears from off all faces."

Look back then ! look around ! look onward ! all by the light that reams from the eternal city ! and in all these thank God ; and while uthank him take courage, or, as the dying teacher said :—" CLING CHRIST, AND GO ON WITH THE WORK."
