Berry, Edward Weldon

Lieutenant, Royal Air Force.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Berry, of Langley Prairie. Attended local schools and McGill, B.C., 1912-1915, U.B.C. 1915-1916, receiving his B.A. degree in 1916. Elected Rhodes scholar from British Columbia at the conclusion of the war. He took up his residence in St. John's College, Oxford, in April, 1919.

He enlisted as a gunner with the 46th Battery in December, 1915, and proceeded to England early in 1916. He served in France with the Third Divisional Signal Company on the Somme, 1916, at Vimy Ridge, Hill 70 and Passchendaele. He was gassed at Loos, 1917. He was invalided to England and, on recovery, was granted a commission in the Royal Air Force.

Edward Berry died at Oxford, on January 23, 1920, of heart disease, resulting from the effects of gas. He was buried in Wolvercote Cemetery, Oxford.
