Valuable prizes are offered to the person submitting the winning song in the University of New Brunswick Song Contest. The competition is open not only to students, undergrad and post-grad, but to Faculty, administration, Alumni and Alumnae. Final date for acceptance has been set as March 31. There will be prizes totaling \$150.00 available for winners; this includes a \$25.00 award for a college yell. \$75.00 is being offered for the best Alma Mater type song, suitable for ceremonies, reunions and the like. An additional \$50.00 is set aside for the winning song suitable for athletic functions and pep rallies.

The Red 'n Black Revue, a variety stage production held annually in Teachers' College starts this evening. The show, cast entirely from the student body is expected this year to over-shadow all previous productions in material, staging, acting and variety. Well-known veterans as Bill Barwick, Jim King, and Jim MacDonald will be featured as well as new talent. The show will be produced by Ian Kennedy, known for his many roles in former revues. Rehearsals started earlier this year in order that the show might be ready for production in February. It is felt that the Fredericton audiences will thoroughly enjoy this year's offering and will be impressed with the many features, including the largest and most beautiful chorus line this side of Montreal.

However, Neil Mulvaney and Eugene McGinley of UNB decisively swamped debaters from St. Thomas in Chatham, Tuesday night when they won by a unanimous decision.

Representing UNB against Kings College of Halifax were Sherman Hans and Vernon Smitz. Dalhousie debaters, also from Halifax were Dave Peel and Hugh Cody. Their opponents were Barry Toole and Elsworth Briggs. In the judges opinion, these two debates were of excellent standard. PHOTOGRAPHERS EXHIBITION

Fredericton — Over 200 photographs by members of the Commercial and Press Photographers' Association of Canada are on exhibition in the University of New Brunswick's Art Centre for a two-week period starting Monday.

The exhibition, which is sponsored here by the UNB Camera Club, was officially opened at 8 p.m. Monday by Dr. Colin B. Mackay, university president. The prints in the exhibit will be open for public inspection.

All the prints in the exhibition have been on a National Tour, embracing 15 different locations throughout Canada, and a great many of the photos are prize-winning works. Some of the prints have also been exhibited at a dozen prints in Western Ontario.

Picture subjects covered in the exhibit include: architecture, fashion, industry, news features, sports, spot news and publicity. The Photographers' Association has 1,000 members in every province of Canada, with a branch group in Saint John.

Rivalry Holds More Promises Than Threats

"International Rivalry Still holds more Promises than Threats for the Future of Mankind" will be the National Debating Topic for this year. This resolution will be the topic of debate during the National Finals at Western University, February 23rd, 24th, and 25th. The winning team will receive the McDonald-Laurier Trophy, emblematic of debating excellence in Canada, and an airplane ticket to meet the best debaters in Europe.

ARCTIC BIOLOGY

Fredericton—An outstanding Canadian zoologist and wildlife authority delivered a public lecture on "Arctic Biology" in the University of New Brunswick's Memorial Hall at 8:15 p.m. Tuesday, February 14.

Dr. Ian McTaggart Cowan, head of the Department of Zoology at the University of British Columbia will also lecture to biology students at the provincial university on Tuesday and Wednesday.

A graduate of U.B.C. and the University of California, Dr. Cowan's specialties are in Ornithology, Mammology, and Wildlife Research. His visit here is sponsored by U.N.B.'s Department of Biology.

Dr. Cowan is a member of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada and the British Columbia Commission. He is president of the Canadian Conservation Association and a past president of the American Wildlife Society. He is also a member of the Associate Committee on wildlife research of the National Research Council, and is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada.

Dr. Cowan will be visiting the St. Andrews Biological Station while in New Brunswick, accompanied by Dr. C. W. Argue, head of U.N.B.'s Biology Department.

UNB represented at McGill Carnival

UNB will be represented at the McGill Winter Carnival starting this week. Neil Mulvaney and Fred Neal will represent the University at the International Debating Competition held annually as a part of the Winter festivities. The topic for debate is "That the Olympic Games do more to create world tension than international world peace". UNB has the affirmative. Debaters from UNB attended last year and rated highly with the other universities. They leave on Thursday evening. Dr. A. Lucas, faculty advisor and coach will accompany them.

He is a member of the National Academy of Sciences, the American Physical Society and an honorary member of the French Chemical Society.
