Good hitting, pitching gives Sabres shutout

What you can't see can hurt you was the lesson learned by Campbellville in their 8-0 fog delayed loss to the Mississauga Ashland Oil Senior Sabres at Huron Park on Friday night.
Prospects didn't look too bright for Campbellville as they took the field in the fifth inning. They were trailing 1-0 and were being stymied at the plate by Sabre hurler, Gary Nickerson. But then things got really dim as the fog rolled in and the Sabre hits rolled out.
The Sabres sent 12 batters to the plate in the fifth and every ball hit to the outfield just disappeared.
While Campbellville outfielders groped about, hoping that they wouldn't be rammied by a passing freighter, six Sabre runs crossed the plate and the game was out of sight for Campbellville.
The Sabres got six hits in that inning, Larry Mackie and Dan Wigle connected for doubles and Alex Lockington, Rick Wilkinson, Charlie Hutchison and Nickerson hit singles.
Campbellville has filed a protest because of the fog but the game should stand.
"They said the game should have been called earlier," said one Sabre, "but we were

ahead anyway, so we should still win."
The Sabres added two more runs in the eighth before the game was finally called on account of rain.

The game was a pleasant reminder to the Sabres of just how well they can hit.

Larry Mackie hit safely four times in five trips to the plate

with 2 RBI, Alex Lockington was three for four also with 2 RBI, Charlie Hutchison was two for two with 3 RBI and Rick Wilkinson batted three for five with an RBI.

Gary Nickerson pitched his second win and second shutout of the season, giving up only four hits. Rick McTrash with a double was the only extra base hit Nickerson gave up.
