The representatives of Manitoba will stand on the terms of settle-ment set forth in the resolution which obtained the unanimous ap-proval of the legislature at the last session, it was learned. This resolu-tion called for the immediate return to provincial control of all lands not allemated and an accounting as be-tween the two governments for all the lands allemated from 1870 until the time of the transfer. This ac-counting, the resolution pointed cut, could be carried on through a board of arbitration and was to be done upon a fiduciary basis. Resolutions Adopted The following was the resolution passed at the last session of the leg-islature:

The following was the resolution passed at the last session of the leg-islature: "Whereas the self-governing pro-vinces of the British dominions, with the acception of the prairie provinces of Canada have been endowed, upon assuming the duties of responsible government, with the control of Crown lands within their boundaries for the purposes of provincial re-venue;

ada, on behalf of the Dominion, has expressed the earnest desire of our settlement to bring about an early settlement of the question: "And whereas the premier of Can-ia, has further stated that the hands could without further delay be handed over to the provinces if the prairie provinces were prepared to ignore the transaction of the past,' and that, 'if, however, the govern-ment of the prairie provinces would not be satisfied with such an ar-rangement, but would prefer an ac-counting between the Dominion and the provinces from the beginning by an independent tribunal, we would not object to such a plan': Full Provincial Rights "He it therefore resolved that this

"He it therefore resolved that this "No if therefore resolved that this house do urge upon the government of the Dominion the immediate re-cognition of full provincial rights for Manitoba in respect of public lands as from 1870.

as from 1870. "And that pursuant to these rights this house do hereby propose to the government of Canada that imme-dinte steps be taken in conjunction with the government of Manitoba to transfer to this province all lands and natural resources within the province hitherto unallenated and to effect an accounting to the province by the Dominion upon a fiduciary basis in respect of the administra-tion and alienation of the natural resources within the province since 15th of July, 1870; "And be it further resolved that in

"And be it further resolved that in the opinion of this house the ac-counting to which this province is entitled is not a mere balancing of receipts and expenditures by the Dominion in respect of Dominion lands, but an accounting to the province upon a fiduciary basis for

resources alienated or administered by the government of Canada; such accounting to proceed upon the re-cognition aforesaid of full provincial rights for Manitoba in respect of public lands as from 1876; "And be it further resolved that if the above basis of such an account-ing be couceded by the Dominion government, the details in the opin-tion of this house might properly be carried out by a board of subitration; and that negotiations to that end should be promptly followed up by the government on behalf of this province."
