- Q On the average how much were you making a week?
- A I was making about thirty-five dollars a week, Sir.
- Q Did you realize that by returning to the Army you would stop earning that money?
- A Oh yes, Sir.
- Q Were your employers prepared to keep you on indefinitely ?
- A So far as I know they were.
- Q Were you satisfied with the work ?
- A Well, I was running a machine for a while and due to ill health they took me offithe machine and put me on a trammer.
- Q How did that suit you?
- A That was alright. There was no walking and no physical labour.
- Q You say you didn't mind that at all ?
- A No, Sir.
- Q You were quite prepared to stay there ?
- A Until I had enough money saved up to look after my wife when I returned to the Army, Sir.
- Q How long would that be in your estimation ?
- A About a month or a month and a half.

 Re-examined by the Defending Officer:
- When you went down to enlist in 1942, when you went up before the board did they ask you if you had ever served in the Army before or did they get that far?
- A I don't remember that part. Sir.
- Q What dondition is your wife in now ?
- A Well, just how do you mean that, Sir.
- Q How is her health?
- A Not very good, Sir.
- Q Why?
- A She is expecting a child.
- Q How soon ?
- A February I guess.

By the Court:

- Q How did you travel from Camp Borden Military Hospital to Parry Sour
- A I walked about twenty-five miles, Sir, and then I caught a freight
- Q Did you walk the twenty-five miles in hospital blues ?
