

THE CRIMES OF ENGLAND

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THE crimes of England have consisted of her failures to check the advance of Germany and to resist all invasions of German ideas. In his satirical letter of introduction to a certain Professor Whirlwind, Mr. Chesterton offers a list of these offenses. "On many occasions we have been very wrong indeed," he confesses. "We were very wrong indeed when we took part in preventing Europe from putting a term to the impious piracies of Frederick the Great. We were very wrong indeed when we allowed the triumph over Napoleon to be soiled with the mire and blood of Blucher's sullen savages. . . . We were very wrong indeed when we praised the soulless Prussian education and copied the soulless Prussian laws." Each of the "crimes" named is treated in a chapter.

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
