CAPT. A. C. KING WINS THE SILVER MEDAL

Capt. Blair's Excellent Score-The Annual Reception by Hon. Col. and Mrs. Gibson to the Marksmen at the Dominion Rifle Meet-

Ottawa, Sept. 4.—Brilliant shooting natch at 200, 500 and 600 yards. shooting opened in good weather, and while there was an irregular wind at times, it held fairly good, with a some-what variable but good light. JUMPED FROM MOVING TRAIN Three Desperate Men Make a Dar-

ing Escape. Toronto, Sept. 4. — Four prisoners on their way to Kingston Penitentiary from Fort William, three of whom escaped, made a daring leap for liberty yesterday afternoon in Paskdale from a train travelling at the rate of 25 miles an hour. It was a cleverly planned piece of work, and the nerve displayed by the desperadoes in leaping from the moving train was nothing short of marvellous. The plans for the escape were carried out in such a remarkably cool manner by the prisoners that the Sheriff and constable in charge of the quartette were fairly dumbfounded for the time be-

The escaped prisoners are: Thomas Burns, sentenced at Fort William to four years in penitentiary for larceny. Alexander Thomas Duncan, sentenced at Port Arthur to two years in penitentiary for burglary and robbery. Harry Jansen, sentenced at Fort William to five years for housebreak-

William to five years for housebreaking and robbery.

John Foster, the young fellow who did not succeed in making his escape, was sentenced at Port Arthur two weeks ago to two years in Kingston for highway robbery.

The prisoners were travelling in the smoking apartment of the strengther.

The prisoners were travelling in the smoking apartment of the steamboat express, on the C. P. R., from Owen Sound. They were in charge of Sheriff Thompson of Fort William and Constable Hessom of Port Arthur. Everything went smoothly until after the express passed the station at Parkdale, where a stop had been made. The train had started, and was going at a rapid rate, when the constables, who had been conversing with the prisonere, were astonished to hear the prisonere, were astonished to hear one end of the chain attached to the handcuffs fall on the floor.

Without a moment's warning two of the men, Duncan and Foster, made a smoking apart ment, and the other two leaped through the two windows, beside which they the two windows, beside which them were seated. Duncan succeeded in getting out of the clutches of Sheriff Thompson, and ran through the coach towards the front end of the car. In trying to get through the door he collided with the conductor, who was coming from the baggage car, and an altercation ensued. Duncan struck the conductor on the face, and jumped into the siding in front of the glass works, near Struchan avenue.

In the meantime Sheriff Thompson was struggling with Foster, who fought desperately to gain his liberty. The Sheriff called to Constable Hesson to direct his attention to the men getting out of the window. Burns had fallen from the window into the long or as heade the tracks, but Jansen. fallen from the window into the long grass beside the tracks, but Jansen, who is a stout man, experienced some difficulty in getting out of the window, and was about half way out, hanging head downwards, when Hesson grasped his right leg. Jansen kicked viciously, and almost stunned the constable, who received a painful kick in the right jaw. The Sheriff, on seeing that the constable was in trouble, instructed him to come and hold Foster. Jansen then dropped to the ground.
