The outlook on the whole is far less
encouraging than last encouraging than last month. A heavy
drop is reported and the crop in drop is reported and the crop in the com-
mercial plum sections is deteriorating
mid rapidly. Plum rot is noted occasionally, and the curculio is very bad this, year.
These pests, combined with the effects
