Several of the Kootenay Towns to Celebrate Dominion Day.

A FIRE BELL FOR SANDON

Permanent Location for C. F. E. Line Into Boundary to Be Commenced at Once—Eva Booth of the Salvation Army, Visits Revelstoke.

Revelstoke will celebrate Dominion Day. The Slokan Independents hold their convention at Sandon on Thursday, June 9.

Cayley Bros., who had the contract for the construction of the bridge across Downie creek, have finished the work.

Commissioner Eva Booth of the Salvation Army, conducted services at Revelstoke last week.

F. Deacon will have a packing contract for the Benetton mine near Golden this season and will build a corral at Bear Creek station for his horses.

President Corbin of the S. F. & N. railway has offered \$2,500 towards the construction of a wagon road from some point on his line to Republic camp.

Nelson is making elaborate preparations for the celebration of Dominion Day. The subscription committee has already raised over \$2,100 for the sports.

The convention for nomination of an opposition candidate to contest the Revelstoke riding at West Kootenay, was held at the Cowan block, Revelstoke, Monday evening.

The British Columbia Mercantile agency, a London corporation, has commenced work on a substantial store building at Cascade City and will put in a large general merchandise stock at once.

The people of Christina Lake country are anxiously looking for the government to commence making some of the many promised roads and trails which are so badly needed around Christina lake.

The Revelstoke board of trade has received no notice of a set date for the first municipal election, though the letter sending the resolution of the meeting called under its auspices was forwarded on Tuesday last.

Section foreman Joe Sharp met with rather a nasty accident at Golden last week. It seems that while unloading ties he was struck on the head, making a wound some four inches long, necessitating the doctor's presence.

Donald is going to have a big Dominion day program. Some \$200 will be given away in medals and prizes. It is suggested that there be a football tournament in connection with the Gun club amament in which bicycle races are arranged for, open to amateurs only. Gold and silver medals to be prizes.

It is proposed to celebrate Dominion Day and July 4, by a joint demonstration at Fort Steele. A grand sports gathering will be held and the arrangements have been left to the following committee: Messrs. Houghton, Bailey and McNish, with power to add to their number.

The people of the Kootenay and neighborhood are not at all satisfied that Kaslo should arrange the candidates for the next provincial elections, and in a few days another candidate will probably be announced as the nominee of the New Denver political club.

Captain Williams of the steamer Columbia, who had built at Arrowhead and was regarded as one of the settled citizens there, has been notified of his transfer to the company's steamer Okanagan lake.

Revelstoke Tuesday took over his new command. The C. P. R. survey party in charge of the route of the Robson and Revelstoke railway has moved its camp from Gilpin's ranch to Greenwood, and it is understood that the work of permanently locating the line will be commenced at once.

The C. P. R. proposes to build a reservoir two and one-third miles southeast of Cranbrook, at an elevation of 270 feet above the townsite, as a means of providing the embryo town with a water supply. The Herald says the reservoir will have a storage capacity of 1,200,000 gallons of water, affording sufficient supply for a city of 10,000 inhabitants.

A public meeting of the electors of the north riding of East Kootenay was held in the I. O. O. F. hall, Golden, last week, for the purpose of selecting a Government candidate for the approaching provincial election. Mr. H. C. H. was in the chair and Mr. Pitts acting secretary.

After a lengthy discussion as to the proper instruction to be given delegates, it was decided that there should be a convention held at Sandon on or about June 6, and other towns were asked to attend. The delegates for Donald are: Messrs. Caldwell, Pitts, and Hobbs.

The Sandon county has purchased a bell for the fire hall that will be very useful for times when several time whistles, often discordant, it is true, but always marking time at intervals none the less. The new bell has inscribed on it a sort of genealogical record of the city officials.

As it is customary for certain religious bodies to have a ceremony called "blessing the bell" on erecting them, it might not be out of place for the council to follow suit.

A black bear for some time past had been in the habit of emerging from his haunts by the Reco trail in the vicinity of the Noble Five side track, to witness the ore packing as it was daily taking place; but the poor fellow now rests from his labors. Tom McCluskey, rifle in hand, caught eight of bruin, and after a couple of well directed shots he rolled over bidding adieu to life even at this period of election excitement. The bear weighed 300 pounds.

A Four Days Celebration. GRAND FORKS, June 6.—[Special.]—The citizens of Grand Forks are arranging for a most elaborate celebration to take place on July 1st here. The program will consist of horseracing, foot-racing, etc. In the evening a grand display of fireworks will be fired from the summit of Observation mountain, which stands some 700 feet above the town. The celebration will last four days.

A FATAL MISTAKE.

The Isakoot Wrecked Near the Mouth of the Sticken River.

VICTORIA, June 7.—The fast river steamer Isakoot, of the K. M. T. & L. company, which in a trial trip held here on May 27th developed an exceptional speed, and on the following day sailed for Wrangle under her own steam, is, according to news by the steamer Boscowitz, just arrived from Nason, and way ports, a total wreck on a pile of rocks in West Inlet, or, as the Indian have it, Eun Leon Arm, a blind passage about five or six miles from the mouth of the Sticken river. She is high out of the water. The officers of the Boscowitz, who talked with the Captain McClellan in charge of the Isakoot, say the catastrophe was caused by a mistake of the pilot, Captain O'Brien, who mistook the cove in which the wrecked steamer is lying, for the mouth of the Sticken and steamed ashore thinking he was entering the river. The tug Chieflain and a barge were secured at Esington and when the Boscowitz came down they were alongside the inlet taking out her machinery and stores. The Isakoot was a comfortable well built vessel, remarkably steady, with a capacity for 200 passengers and 125 tons of freight. She was 145 feet long, 31.5 feet on the beam and powerfully engine. Her builders were the B. C. Iron Works company of Vancouver, who fitted her out in the most approved fashion. She carried a searchlight, steam steering gear and in fact all the modern appliances. She was insured in Lloyds.

TRAVELING LIBRARIES.

The Books That Govern the Loaning of Books. A move should be made to secure one of the traveling library services for Rossland, which has been authorized by the last legislature. There is a scarcity of books in Rossland and the following are the rules that govern the loaning of books from these libraries:

"Being a resident of... over 15 years of age, I hereby agree, as a borrower from the British Columbia traveling library, to promptly return the books within the time specified, and to pay any fines due by me for over-detection of books, or for injury to or loss sustained by any book while charged to me."

Persons under 15 years of age shall be entitled to the same privileges as the foregoing in case their agreement is indorsed by a parent or guardian, or by any of the petitioners for the library, or the trustee.

Two volumes may be drawn by each reader and retained two weeks. A fine of five cents per week shall be paid for each book kept over time, and no books shall be lent to any one to whom books or an unpaid fine are charged.

Fines shall be paid to the librarian and used under the direction of the trustee for library purposes.

A reader desiring a book not at the time on the shelves, may have it reserved for him for 48 hours after its return, by giving notice to the librarian.

A reader returning a book which is not reserved may renew it for two weeks.

Notes, corrections of the press, or marginal references of any kind, not belonging to the province, are unconditionally forbidden, and all losses or injuries beyond reasonable wear, from whatever cause, must be adjusted to the satisfaction of the trustee by the person to whom the book is charged.

Books must be handled with care and leaves must not be turned down.

The librarian shall keep an accurate date of all books lent out, and all records of all borrowing and return, cards for which purpose are provided with each library sent out.

A library may remain for three months in any community, at the end of which time, however, it shall be the duty of the librarian to forward it, packed up as received, to a designated address supplied by the provincial librarian.

In case of an application being received by the provincial librarian and trustee of the library, requesting an extension of time not exceeding three months, the same may be granted.

An accurate record shall be kept of the books lent out and the date of their return and a full report of the same shall be forwarded at the end of every three months to the Provincial Librarian, whose duty it will be to publish such returns in his annual report.

A printed catalogue of the books in each library shall accompany the same.

IN OUTSIDE CAMPS

Rainbow Ore Gives Returns of 1500 Ounces in Silver.

THE TRUE BLUE STRIKE

Operations Have Been Resumed on the Payne-Rich Copper Ore in the East Kootenay Country—What the Athabasca Is Doing—Notes.

Signs of great activity are noticeable in the several mining divisions and the present year is certain to be a banner one so far as development and production are concerned. The Slokan division is particularly active. In the Boundary country the miners are working with renewed energy because of the certainty it is felt that there will soon be transportation facilities afforded that section by the construction of the C. & W. branch of the C. P. R. into that section. In the Fort Steele section in East Kootenay a road is being constructed, and transportation there is assured. Appended are the reports from the mining divisions:

SLOKAN DIVISION.

Frank Provost was displaying recently at Slokan City, some fine samples of iron cap ore mingled with quartz and sulphides, which was encountered in the Twin Sisters mineral claim, while prospecting for the main ledge. The property is situated on the first north fork of Lemor creek.

The Old Gray claim near Slokan City, formerly owned and operated by Seattle parties, was restaked recently by They Hauck and the Heckman brothers. They remained on the ground all night. After staking it they returned to town and went immediately to the government office where the claim was recorded in the names of Paul and J. E. Skinner recently visited Rainbow, from which he brought some easily run 1,500 ounces in silver. Considerable work has been done on this property and the paystreak, which is eight inches in width is gradually being coming larger.

The Bismarck regular shipper. The Payne tramway took up the key of its rumbling song again last week and the interval has gradually been start and the force has since grown to something like 80 men. In the mine a large force of men was engaged on development and ore breaking during the period. About the tramway was disabled. Heavy shipments will begin again about the 10th inst., and will continue throughout the summer.

There is nothing new from Four Mile. All the properties on this rich creek are looking for the shipments lately made. Others will follow during the summer. A great amount of prospecting is going on to find the most promising points at which to open up the many claims not yet developed.

Enough ore is now in sight on the Mollie Hughes to pay for the property and two more ledges have been discovered and are yet to be opened.

Frank Watson, manager of the Arlington mine, states that work will be resumed on the property as soon as the new road is completed.

Stevenson and Fraser, who have been doing assessment work on the Trax claim, on the mountain side four miles southwest of Kaslo, have had an assay made on their rock which shows values of \$6 in gold and 32 per cent copper. The claim was located May 29, 1897.

They are said to have a 11-foot ledge of this class of rock. Several claims have been located on the strength of the True Blue assays.

EAST KOOTENAY.

T. A. Knowlton will ship shortly a car load of ore from the Sunday mine at Ottertail.

Messrs. T. A. Knowlton and W. R. Lindsay arrived at Golden recently from the east and proceeded to Ottertail, with a view to renewing work on the Sunday claim. They brought seven miners with them from the east.

Mr. Jolliffe recently left Golden for the coast to consult with the Hon. D. Dewdney as to the work to be done this season on the claims in which they are interested in the International basin.

A party of prospectors from West Kootenay has located a group of claims opposite the Mineral King on Toby creek. The ore is copper and looks very promising. Mr. C. Haas, J. Oustance, D. Glaze, S. stock in the famous Rio Tinto Copper Mining company of Spain. It is a very rich property and the sale is still good. The shipments of ore last week from Fort Steele amounted to 132 tons, at a gross valuation of \$5,603.40; an average of \$55.50 per ton.

A. W. McVittie and C. D. Rand of Spokane, are negotiating the sale of the English, the Golden Five group of mining properties, situated at the forks of Wild Horse creek. The negotiations are now well under way, and the sale is expected to be completed shortly.

NELSON DIVISION.

At the meeting of the shareholders of the Athabasca Mining company, held in New Westminster recently, 931,305 shares were represented out of the million. The meeting was called to ratify a sale of the Athabasca group of mines, which was unanimously approved. The agreement of sale provides for the incorporation of a new company in England, to be known as the Athabasca Gold Mines, limited, with a capital of \$200,000 to take over the property. One hundred and forty thousand pounds, being 90 per cent of the entire capital, is given to the present company as advance money toward the property. Ten thousand pounds has been put up in cash for the purchase of machinery and for the further development of the property. An additional \$10,000 will be available for working capital if required.

There is also made for the placing of stock on the English market under a pool agreement with the English company which has promoted the deal, which practically assures to the present holders of stock 80 to 85 cents per share, while, with the increased development, it is confidently expected that the value of the stock will go up. The new company takes the property dating from April 12 last, and their engineer has been in charge of the work since then. Work is proceeding on three different ledges at the present time. Altogether the prospects of the company never looked so well as they do at the present time.

McKenzie & Mann, the railroad contractors, recently bought the Big Patch group for \$45,000 for 30 days, Darrow & French, the owners, to retain a one-fifth interest in the property. The Big Patch is situated at the head of Porcupine creek. McKenzie & Mann will put a force of men to work on the Big Patch at once and develop the property as rapidly as possible. Assays have been made on picked samples that run as high as \$3,900 to the ton.

BOUNDARY CREEK COUNTRY.

The final payment of \$27,000 on the B. C. mine in Summit camp was made recently by A. H. Harrison, representing the purchasers to John W. Keogh & Sons. The purchase price was \$60,000. Since the bond was taken, about a year ago, almost 700 feet of work has been done and 1,200 tons of high grade copper ore is on the dump. This is the largest single payment yet made on a Boundary Creek property.

Fine ore has been brought to Grand Forks from the Caledonia on Hardy mountain, owned by George Hicken and partners.

D. A. Carmichael, the owners of the Flora group, in Fairview camp, have bonded the property to Ritchie & Stewart for \$15,000. The claims are in the vicinity of the Spangwinder, and have an excellent showing of copper. A new strike of rich ore is reported on the Tin Horn mine, at Fairview, and though the result of the assays have not been announced as yet, it must be very satisfactory as the management is busy preparing to greatly increase the working force of the mine immediately.

AINSWORTH DIVISION.

The Whitewater Deep is now taking out and sacking ore and expects to begin shipping shortly. The new blower recently put in runs like a charm. A wagon road has been completed and a force of men is now engaged on cabins and houses.

KAMLOOPS DIVISION.

R. Scott, of Kockford, Nicola, has obtained assays carrying from \$12.50 to \$49.72 in copper and from a trace to \$5.88 in gold from the Trax mine. The Queen of the Valley an assay of 10.08 ounces gold and 78.72 ounces silver was got making a total value of \$255.58. The ledge is 1/2 feet wide.

RETURNED FROM OTTAWA.

Richard Armstrong, Business Man and Politician, Arrives Home. Richard Armstrong, who has just returned from an extended trip to Ottawa, is of the opinion that the Liberal leaders regret that D. O. Corbin was not granted a railway charter to the Boundary Creek country this year. He expects that something will be done by the executive council by which the charter will be granted next year.

Mr. Armstrong does not believe that the Liberal party will appeal to the country during the coming autumn as has been predicted in some quarters.

Speaking of the condition of the Conservative party, he said that there is evidently a desire on the part of W. F. McLean, J. Ross Robertson and Clarke Wallace to reorganize the party and Charles Tupper, but believes that Sir Charles will remain in control for some time to come and when he does resign the leadership, he succeeded Hon. G. E. Foster.
