### Onondaga Council

Middleport, June 2, 1913. The Council met this day pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The Reeve in the chair. The minutes of last meeting read. Moved by Mr. VanSickle, seconded by Mr. McBlane, that the minutes, as read, be adopted. Carried.

No communications, but the Canada Ingot Iron Co., was represented by their agent. By permission a deputation from Onondaga Village, consisting of Messrs J. A. Walker and S. J. Church, ill addressed the Council in reference to sidewalks in the village, stating that they had a liberal amount subscribed together with aid from the nearby farmers in regard to teaming also they had the promise of 200 yds of free gravel and plenty of sand and financial aid from the Council at this opportune time would go a long way in securing the necessary work.

Moved by Mr. MacBlane, seconded by Mr. VanSickle that this Council do now adjourn the members thereof to form into a Court of Revision. The members of the Council qualified as such Court; M. N. Simpson, president. The following appeals were considered: Mr. Cuthbertson, for Dunnville Tel. Co., complaint, not assessable; judgment reserved. Mr. Dixon, for Bell Tele. Co., complaint, not assessable; judgment reserved.

Messrs M. Hunter and Thos. Howden, were applicants for several names to be placed on or taken off the Voters' List. The appeals before the Court having been disposed of Council resumed.

The following accounts were read: Thos. Howden, 2-3 value of 2 sheep killed by dogs, \$16; R. McLeod for spikes and wire for Bateman bridge, 70 cents; J. H. Campbell, insurance of town hall, \$4.00; A. Burrill, part salary, \$62.50; postage \$2.85; delivering road lists, \$10.00. Moved by Mr. Rose, seconded by Mr. Walker, that the several accounts being found correct, be now paid and that the Reeve sign his order on the treasurer in favor of the several claimants for the sums respectfully due them. Carried.

Moved by Mr. VanSickle, seconded by Mr. Rose, that a grant of \$800 be given to the Improvement Committee of Onondaga Village for the purpose of laying a concrete walk from the G. T. R. station to the post office in Onondaga Village, a distance of 705 yards, said sidewalk to be 3 1-2 feet in width and also a walk to be laid 1 foot in width from said sidewalk to Township Hall, together with steps up to Hall door. The gravel being furnished free of cost. Carried. On motion the Council adjourned to meet at Town Hall on June 17th, at 10 a.m.

### PARENTS CENSURED.

**Coroner Says They Practically Drove Daughter to Take Poison**  
The parents of Alice Mary Walton aged sixteen, upon whose body an inquest was held at Bishop O'Flley, North Staffordshire, on Tuesday, were severely censured by both coroner and jury for their inhumanity to the girl. The funeral arrangements had been stopped by order of the county coroner. It was stated in evidence that the girl had been scolded by her father on May 8 and had been sent to bed, and subsequently complained

of severe pains, but a doctor was not called in until May 14. He found her suffering from gastritis, and on the Friday she was dangerously ill. Dr. Hope was then told by the mother that the child had said something about taking rat poison, but it was only a flippant sort of remark, and he gave a certificate showing gastritis to be the cause of death, the symptoms being quite consistent with the illness. An autopsy made by Dr. Sixon and Dr. Gosse, of Eccleshall, conclusively proved phosphorus poisoning to be the cause of death. In returning a verdict of "Suicide from phosphorus poisoning, while smarting under correction from her father, and not in a normal state of mind," the jury asked the coroner to censure the parents. The coroner said that not only had they given their evidence in a most unsatisfactory manner, but the poor girl had practically been driven to her action by their inhuman treatment.
