MOTOR COMPANY IS WOUND UP

Creditors to the Extent of \$75,000 Are Concerned-- Meeting To-Day.

TORONTO, Feb 9.—An order winding up the Tudhope Motor Company of Orillia, has been made at Osgood Hall by Mr. Justice Middleton on the petition of Paris and Birmingham, of Cleveland, manufacturers; creditors for over \$2,000. The company was incorporated with a nominal capital stock of \$500,000. A proposition was made for satisfying the trade creditors' claims with preferred stock of the Fisher Motor Company of Walkerville, but the petitioners objected and it is held that they cannot be compelled to accept the proposition by the majority of creditors. The scheme was approved by a meeting of creditors, where 26 out of 45 creditors representing \$53,061 out of \$75,000 were represented. It was urged by the majority that there would be practically nothing for them unless they accepted the Fisher stock. Other creditors according to a statement filed, are the Royal Bank \$750,000, mostly secured; the Tudhope Carriage Company \$43,423 and W. H. Tudhope \$21,700.

Turned Out By Fire In Toronto

TORONTO, Feb. 9.—Fire at 6.30 this morning at Nos. 10 and 12 Vivian Place, destroyed two of the six houses with loss of \$6,000 and turned sixteen people into the street. T. W. Gillies thawed his gas pipes in the cellar of No. 10 and after completing the job came up stairs to find the woodwork of the first floor had caught fire and flames were spreading into the living room where his wife and two children were sleeping. The fire spread rapidly to the next house occupied by James Edgar. Most of the inmates escaped to the street, scantily clad.

Queer Hockey

As Exemplified by an Ottawa Player on Saturday.

[By Special Wire to The Courier] MONTREAL, Feb. 9.—The Gazette this morning says: It is alleged by several who witnessed the match between Ottawa and the Wanderers at Ottawa on Saturday night that Percy Lesueur, playing manager of the Ottawa club, devoted a great deal of time to a new style of coaching during the play. While the Ottawa players were holding their own against the Wanderers Lesueur was satisfied to sit on the bench and coach the players. When the tide turned against his team, it is alleged that he made his way to the bleachers and encouraged the occupants of "millionaire's row" to get after Billy Nicholson, pleading with them to help Ottawa win by getting Nicholson off his game. This, it was stated, was responsible for the throwing of articles of various descriptions at Nicholson bleacher end of the field. If there is any truth in this report, then it is up to the National Hockey Association to deal with the matter. Lesueur is not only a player but an officer of the Ottawa club, and should be held responsible for the conduct of the crowd towards visiting teams. Lesueur is under the jurisdiction of the association during the playing of a match, and such conduct is worthy of an investigation.

Authors and Film

LONDON, Feb. 9.—Mr. Cecil Raleigh has started an agitation, which is to be taken up by the Authors' Society, against the unauthorized production—mostly by foreign firms—of picture plays bearing the titles of successful novels and dramas. It is possible that some alteration of the copyright law may be the result. "It is a disgrace to our laws," said Mr. Raleigh, "that at present the title of any popular novel or drama can be put on a film without the consent of the author of the book or drama. The law with regard to copyright in a title is very obscure, and some authorities hold that there can be no copyright in a name, which means that it is possible to stick a well-known title on a film which is not connected with the subject for which the title was originally chosen. The titles of several well-known plays are thus being used at present. There is another point also in this connection that is not understood by the public. After a play has been running for perhaps three years and its place is taken by another, the writer may sell the moving picture rights; but there is nothing to prevent a firm from putting the title of the play on any film and advertising it in this way, to the detriment of the real production."

MANITOBA LIBERALS

WINNIPEG, Feb. 9.—A general convention of Manitoba Liberals has been called for this city for March 26 and 27. The purpose of the convention is to consider the political situation, declare a platform and prepare for the general election which is now looked for in early midsummer. Imperial service medals have been granted for long and meritorious service to George Hillier, caretaker at Osgoode Hall, and three lockmasters on canals, John Collins, J. J. Gordon and C. R. Collier.
