German Forces are Cut Off

BRITISH HOUSE COMMENCES CONSIDERATION OF THE PROBLEMS RELATING TO THE WAR

REICHSTAG Will Assemble for Business To-morrow.

Berlin, Oct. 10.—8 p.m.—via London, Oct. 11.—The Reichstag will reassemble at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning and open debate on the chancellor's speech and the general situation. Despite the almost uninterrupted deliberations between party and government representatives in committee since the chancellor's speech was delivered, the attitude of the Reichstag, or even of the committee on the burning issues of the day is still not clearly defined.

Premier Asquith Asks For a Credit of £300,000,000—This is the Thirteenth Like Request Since Hostilities Commenced; Nationalists Against the Government

London, Oct. 11.—The House of Commons to-day began consideration of the serious problems resulting from the war, with the introduction by Premier Asquith of a new vote of credit for £300,000,000. Under the procedure of parliament, this step permits members to discuss any subject. It was expected the debate would cover a wide range and would include, in addition to financial questions the government of Ireland, which Nationalists who have definitely taken sides against the government will bring up; the question of extension of conscription to Ireland, which Unionists are urging, but which it is understood, the government opposes and the obtaining of more men from England, Scotland and Wales by the close scrutiny of men under forty years of age who have been thus far exempted from military service. NEW WAR CREDIT

Berlin, Oct. 10.—via London, Oct. 11.—11.25 a.m.—A bill for a new war credit of 12,000,000,000 marks will shortly be submitted to the Reichstag. The bill has only a precautionary character but is deemed necessary because the margin between the credit granted to June 1916, totalling 62,000,000,000 marks and the sum of 47,000,000,000 marks raised through the five war loans, has become rather small.

THE SUPPLIES Of the American Red Cross Commission Will Be Exhausted by the End of November.

Belgrade, via London, Oct. 11.—The food supplies of the American Red Cross relief commission will be exhausted by the end of November, and the commission's relief work in Serbia will then cease, according to Dr. Edward Stuart, director of the commission. Rumania's entrance into the war, making it impossible to get food, and lack of support on the part of the people of the United States are given by Dr. Stuart as the responsible causes.

anged to supply free food to 10,000 people after the commission ceases its work, and will give pensions of twenty to two hundred crowns monthly to another 10,000. This will leave 16,000 unprovided for. The situation, however, is not as serious as it has been. Dr. Stuart stated to-day that the Red Cross had been able to tide the needy Serbians over the bad time, while the crops were growing, and that nobody was starving now.

NEEDS RE-INFORCING

Dublin, Oct. 11.—The Irish division at the front will need reinforcements of 30,000 men before Christmas, according to a statement made last night by Lord Wimborne, the Lord Lieutenant, in an address made at a banquet. The Lord Lieutenant said that before the war there were 34,822 Irishmen with the colors and in the reserves. Since mobilization, 92,404 Catholics and 62,391 Protestants had joined the army from various parts of Ireland.

GAINS RECORDED BY THE ALLIED FORCES UPON EVERY WAR FRONT
