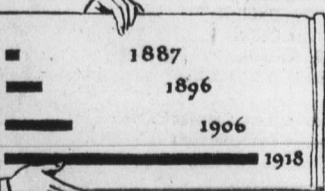
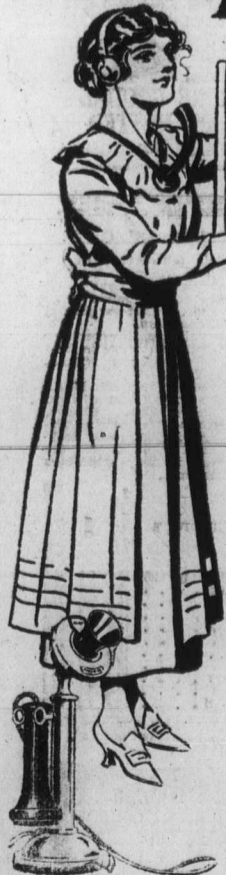
Capt. Bates was married twice His first wife was Anna Swan, a native of New Annan, Col. Co., and she was some inches taller than her husband.
