JOINT REFORM MEETING.
A joint Reform meeting in the interests of Geo. Stephens and D. A. Gordon was held on the 10th inst. at Chatham town hall. The meeting was held in the evening. Roderick McKenzie occupied the chair. Mr. Ball was the first speaker. He spoke on the closer trade relations between Canada and England during the past four years. Referring to the better times, he called attention to the better prices farmers were now obtaining for their produce. He said that formerly a bushel of wheat would bring \$1.25. Mr. Ball was well listened to.

N. H. Stevens was exceedingly well received and his remarks were punctuated with cheers and applause. Corn, cold storage and the preferential tariff were the chief topics of his discourse.

J. C. Stuart on behalf of the Liberal-Conservative party, was allowed 20 minutes. He spoke on the high prices, instancing coal oil and other necessities.

Frederic Stone made an excellent address dealing with the trade question, the administration of the post office department, and preferential trade. Mr. Stone was given a good hearing, mixed with lots of applause.

The meeting broke up with cheers for the Queen, George Stephens and D. A. Gordon.

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USING RALLY.

An Attempt to Pack the Conservative Meeting at Merlin Re-echoes on the Liberals.

Meeting at Merlin was a great success. Conservative speakers were Thomas Smail, J. M. Pike, and C. R. Atkinson, Jr., who were opposed by Donald Farquharson and Edwin Bell, who were generously accorded an hour or twice as much as Reformers give Conservatives at their meetings.

Mr. Smail's opening was a clear and conclusive exposition of the false promises of the Laurier government regarding the independence of parliament matter, the plebiscite vote and prohibitory law, the corruption condoned by the government in the Brockville and West Huron elections.

Mr. Farquharson, for the Liberals dealt with the prohibition question from the Liberal standpoint, and delivered a telling temperance lecture, but failed to offer any excuse for the government's deceit in not passing a prohibitory bill.

Mr. Bell, president of the Reform Association, then spoke, endeavoring to defend the government regarding the increased debt, expenditure and taxation, explained the Laurier one-sided preferential trade fallacy, condemned the Tories generally, referred to the prohibition question, went back into ancient history re binder line and an ancient meeting at Titcher being now, dealt briefly on coal and cold storage, and wound up with a eulogy on "William Mulock."

Mr. Pike delivered a stirring address, completely shattering Mr. Bell's contentions and excuses on the different matters dealt with. Mr. Pike was loudly applauded for the manner in which he explained the Conservative policy of preferential trade and cold storage and closed a splendid address amid great applause.

Mr. Atkinson followed and what was left of Mr. Bell's speech was Mr. Pike got through, was literally torn to shreds. While Mr. Atkinson was denouncing the government, several Liberals, who had been gathered from Valletta and Fletcher and the country round about, to pack the meeting at Merlin, and try and make a scoop, left the building. Although there was a Conservative meeting at Titcher being addressed by Matthew Wilson, where they would naturally go, when he received no opposition they planned the scheme.

Merlin meeting, which failed, and the medicine they got was so powerful, logical and true, that they could not stand it. Mr. Atkinson dealt in a most masterly way with the binder line and coal oil questions, which he placed before the electors in an unanswerable manner. He also dealt with wire and the increased taxation, debt and expenditure, showing conclusively that this all bore on the farmers far more than on all other classes of the community. Mr. Atkinson was witty and very pointed throughout and drew a comparison of the candidates which was much applauded. He closed amid great applause.

Mr. Atkinson's address was admitted to be a well-prepared and convincing one, and our friends about Merlin are very confident of large gains for the popular Conservative candidates. The Reformers are crestfallen as the result of the complete failure of their "pack the meeting" plan.
