The Favored Section Is Constantly Changing-From Earliest Times a Favorite Locality for Military Reviews-A Great Day in Its History When Queen Victoria Opened the Great Exhibition in 1851.

It is a popular error to speak of Hyde Park as a wholly fashionable resort, says The London Express. The truth, of course, is that only a portion of the park is fashionable, and this portion is constantly being

Early in the reign of Charles II. and well on into the reigns of the Georges, it was to the Ring, the ornamental ground attached to the banqueting-house and the Tyburn meadow in the northeast corner, where Park Lane and Bayswater road now are, that the gallants and fair women flocked, and, indeed, this was the first spot in the park to be rendered exclusively smart.

The section of London that lives for enjoyment drifted to Kensington, gardens, where the court in the reigns of William and Mary and Queen Anne lived so much at the recently-acquired country house, Ken-sington Palace, and there walking. in the slow and affected manner the day, rendered necessary by the extraordinary headgear that prevailed and the stiffly formal hoops and suits that were worn, was a la mode, for then, as now, no coaches or carriages were allowed in those sylvan glades.
