

THE NORTHWEST INDIANS.

Lieut. Governor Dewdney received a despatch last August stating that eight whites had been butchered by marauding Indians, 33 miles south of Maple Creek in the Cypress Hills. It is believed that the Indians came on the victims by stealth, and when a favourable opportunity presented itself, pounced upon them. Some of those attacked escaped by swimming and wading across the narrow lake and barricading themselves in Sande lumber mill. Thirty-eight police left Winnipeg by train, for the scene of the butchery, and a like number from Medicine Hat. Great excitement is said to exist amongst the settlers around Maple Creek. If the Indians begin a guerilla warfare it will be worse than the rebellion.
