A subscriber residing in Kingman, under date of Feb. 23, sends us the following account of the sad accident on the Maine Central railway whereby three employes lost their lives. He also sends a sketch of the main line and siding where the accident occurred.

There was a very bad accident on the Maine Central R.R. to-day about 11 miles east of here at a place called Boyd Mills. The express going east at 3 o'clock, ran into a siding that is at the place. There were cars on the siding some getting repaired and some loaded with hay. There is no doubt in the minds of the people but what the switch was left open by the carelessness of some of the workmen there.

There were three lives lost, two postal clerks and the fireman, the last named was literally torn to pieces. One poor fellow from St. John was caught in the rack and could not get out; his legs and back were broken; he held those around him that he had to go and bid them good bye. The cars at this time were on fire and in a minute more the fire added the poor fellows' sufferings. There were two passenger cars and one pullman and engine and tender destroyed by fire. The charged remains of the three men were got after the fire. There was no water to be had and this left all hands helpless to put out the fire. The engine escaped death but was a miracle how he managed to crawl out from among the wreckage that was so hot that he could not get out. It was a bitter cold morning but all of the passengers were well cared for here, they left again with a made up train at 5 p.m. The passengers lost all their baggage and the mails were destroyed.
