SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST **Homestead Regulations**

A NY even 'numbered section of Dominion Lancds in Manitoba or the Northwest Province, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homosteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, or 100 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. An application for entry or cancellation made personally at any Sub-agent's office may be wired to the Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the present papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "personation" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim or if entry has been granted it will be summarily cancelled.

An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eli-gible for homestead entry, and only one ap-plication for cancellation will be recoived from an individual until that application has been disposed of

from an individual until that application has been disposed of.

Where an entry is cancelled subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for cancellation will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicant for cancellation must state in applicant to cancellation must state in fault.

A homesteader whose entry is not the subject of cancellation preseedings, may, subject to the approva of Department, reliacuish it in favour of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister if eligible, but to me one else, on filing declaration of abandonment.

the duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon
and cultivation of the load in each year durling the term of three years.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

At least \$190 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been excended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$10 per acre.
