PONCE, P. R., Aug. 2, via St. Thomas, Aug. 3.—The Porto Ricans of Ponce lined the streets by hundreds and filled the air with cheering on the arrival of General Garretson's brigade from Yauco.

The arrival of these troops and those on the St. Louis makes the fighting strength of the Americans now operating near Ponce about nine thousand men, equal to the entire force of the Spanish fighting men on the island.

General Garretson's camp is temporariy located on the outskirts of the town. The brigade marched 17 miles from Yauco to Ausby, where they arrived travel-stained and mud bespattered. Almost the entire population saw the troops pass through the city and gave cher after cheer.
