Minister of Customs is Holding Good Vacancies for Men Now at the Front

Montreal's vacant collectorship of customs occupied the attention of Parliament for some time recently, and Hon. Dr. Reid, Minister of Customs, made an emphatic declaration that Mr. Bertram of Toronto, was there only temporarily and that position was being held open for a qualified returned soldier.

Hon. Mr. Graham enquired how many returned soldiers so far had been appointed to positions in the customs? Hon. Dr. Reid replied that so far 203 had been appointed at salaries averaging around \$900 and \$1,000 a year.

Hon. Mr. Graham said that when Mr. Robert White resigned from the collectorship of customs in Montreal, Mr. Bertram, of Toronto, had been sent there, and it seemed now a question as to which place was vacant, Toronto or Montreal.

Hon. Dr. Reid said: "I decided to send Mr. Blair to Toronto because he had just lost his son at the front, and Toronto is not as hard a port to manage just now as Montreal. So I asked Mr. Bertram to go to Montreal until some soldier should come back capable of taking the position."

"There is no returned soldier in my mind for that position. I am waiting for them to come back. But I do know that there are a number of prominent men from Montreal, well qualified to fill that position, who are now at the front. I have the names of one or two who have been wounded and have the names of others who have won honors for bravery. I have said, and I repeat it, that if one of these men, I don't care who he is, returns and is qualified to fill that position he will be appointed and Mr. Bertram will return to Toronto."

Hon. Dr. Reid explained he had left the matter in that way, and had sent Mr. Bertram to Montreal because it was better to send an outsider rather than to promote a man in the service at Montreal who would later on feel it hard to be set down. So long as he was Minister of Customs he declared, he intended to adhere to the principle that every possible vacancy in his department should be filled by men who had been wounded on active service.

Hon. Mr. Graham suggested that there were certain Conservatives in Montreal who believed that the position was being held open for a wounded political aspirant, perhaps one who had been a minister, although not necessarily the Minister of Customs, but some one now in the

Government who would be out in the rearrangement to come. He was, therefore, glad to have it made clear that Mr. Bertram was only temporarily in Montreal, and that the job would later be given to a returned soldier.

"If he returns while I am administering the department he will," said Hon. Dr. Reid. "So far as filling this position at Montreal is concerned, when I say it will be filled by a returned soldier, that means that it is the Conservative policy, and I only hope if my hon. friend ever gets to this side of the House he will give the returned soldiers the same treatment I am giving them." (Applause.) "An excellent idea," said Mr. Graham, and this closed the incident, the House returning to the consideration of estimates.

WHO ARE AVAILABLE FOR WAR
According to the last census, which from the Prime Minister's indication is to be the basis of information in working out the new Military Service Bill, there are 1,537,581 males in Canada between the ages of 20 and 45. The foreign-born among them total 278,652.

Of the grand total, 734,324 were single; 773,414 married, 16,461 widowed, 871 divorced and 12,541 unknown.

The number between 20 and 45 in Ontario was placed at 514,448 and in Quebec 342,149.

After all exemptions are taken into account, it is calculated that 450,000 men will be available in all the classes.

It is believed that the 100,000 men called for by the Borden Bill will be

secured in calling up the first three classes.
